**OBJECTION MADE TO
EDMONTON GAMBLING**
Resolution of Ministerial Association Sent to Mayor Blatchford Asking for Action
EDMONTON, October 9.—Protesting against the use of candy wheels and other forms of gambling as a means of raising money at carnivals, the General Ministerial Association of Edmonton, comprising the ministers of all denominations in the city, have filed a resolution with Mayor Blatchford as police commissioner, with the request that the matter be brought before the council for action and to inform aldermen of the stand taken by the association.
The official protest was filed with His Worship by Rev. J. F. Knight, secretary of the association, and is signed by Rev. A. C. Bingham, as president.
A general meeting of the association on September 27 passed the resolution unanimously after considering the matter from every angle for over an hour and the written memorandum to the mayor states that while the association most heartily commends the work undertaken by the several social service clubs of the city, it nevertheless stands uncompromisingly opposed to the common practice of gambling so generally adopted and popularized as a means of raising money for social service work.
