Harrison, contractor, of this city, has secured the contract for the construction of a large cannery plant in Queen Charlotte City 4 for the British Columbia Fishery and Packing Company and has left for the northern port to undertake this work. The cannery is to be one of the most modern and up-to-date plants of its kind in the north and will cost, it is estimated,



CALGARY, March 29 .- Fourteen thoroughbred race horses valued at \$30,000 were burned to death and two others were killed by a C.P.R. train after escaping from a burning barn at Victoria Park early Sunday morning. Six men were asleep in gate, Thurston Harbor, Lockethe building but it was well afire before they awoke and it was then too late to save the animals.

Twelve of the horses which lost their lives were owned by Robert Emmert of Winnipeg.
