

CANADA'S BIG RIFLE SHOOT

D. C. R. A. Meeting Will Open at Ottawa on August 17.

OTTAWA, July 24. (By Canadian Press.)—Canada's national rifle shooting meeting, opening August 17, familiarly known as the "D. C. R. A." promises this year to excel any prize meeting held since the year 1913, or before the war, and it is expected that there will be an increase in attendance of competitors of more than 100 from all over the Dominion. Rifle shooting has shown great progress during the past year, and the summer shooting now under way shows a 100 per cent increase in attendance at the various ranges over 1925. Last winter 177 teams took part in the indoor competitions as compared with 126 teams two years ago. Toronto reports 490 men shooting every Saturday, and similar reports come from all the large cities.

The "D. C. R. A." programme this year has not been changed materially from that of last year, but any of the changes made will meet with general approval, particularly that portion which adds 18 prizes to the tail end of each of the important matches, ensuring for the new shot a good chance of coming into the money more frequently than in the past. The Governor General's match will be shot this year in the usual two stages, but the final stage will be at 300 and 900 yards, when 15 shots must be fired at each range. Both ranges of the Bankers' Match will this year be in the Grand Aggregate, and aperture sights will be permitted at all ranges of all the squadded competitions in the aggregate.

King's Medal

The King's Medal competition has been taken out of the middle of the week and will be fired on Friday afternoon as a distinct event. The Gzowski and Dunaldson matches will be conducted as team events, as they were in the old days at Rockcliffe, and will have no connection with the King's Medal match. The conditions of the King's Medal call for four practices. The first is for deliberate shooting at 600 yards. This will be followed by the fire with movement practice, which means that the competitor will start from 600 yards and fire 10 shots at distances up to 100 yards. The target will be exposed for 45 seconds for each two shots, and in the interval between exposure, which is only 15 seconds, the competitor prepares for the next round. When the target appears he must run to the next firing point, 100 yards away, and fire two shots, all within 45 seconds. The third practice is a rapid fire competition at 300 yards, and this is followed by a snapshooting test at the same distance. The rapid is ten shots at a standard target, in 40 seconds, and the snapshooting is at a 22-inch disc which is exposed 40 times at irregular intervals.

Added Features

An added feature in the King's Medal match will be a team competition, for teams of four men whose combined scores make the highest total. For this match, General Sir Arthur Currie is offering a valuable trophy, and the competition for this should be very keen.

In the Service Revolver Match, the 45 Colt has been admitted on equal ground with the .455, as a concession to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, who are armed with the .45.

An Egg Pool competition will run continuously throughout the week, and valuable prizes are offered daily, besides a valuable list for the aggregates of the week.

In addition to the above there is the usual attractive prize list of all classes of shooting for cadets, tyros and senior shots, for which over \$12,000 is offered in cash prizes in addition to the \$100,000 worth of trophies. There will be shooting with the .22 rifle. Also, an interesting series of revolver matches, concluding with the military Revolver Championship.

Supreme Test of Skill

What the "King's Prize" is to Bisley, the Governor General's match is to Connaught Range, the supreme test of the rifleman's skill. While it is important to do good shooting in the Governor General's contest, consistent scoring is required throughout the whole week in order to win a place on the Bisley Team for next year, which after all, is the objective of most men who at-

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lend the meeting. Col. D. R. Street will be executive officer, Lt.-Col. R. J. Bird-whistle, assistant executive officer, and Major R. O. Wheatley, chief range officer. The Association has provided interesting social amusement features, and the attraction each evening is the free entertainment in the big hangar on the ranges. Sixteen competitors from each of the provinces are given free transportation, and in addition a refund of one-fifth of the single fare is made by the Association to all who attend. The prospects for a record meeting are very bright and the week of August 17 should see Connaught Range the scene of the biggest gathering of rifle shots ever assembled in Canada in competition.

Belanger is the former Canadian Olympic and Pan-American amateur champion, who turned professional not quite a year ago, and has been bowling over the best of the light heavies since then. In seventeen professional starts Belanger has already stacked up against some of the best in the country, including such battlers as Jack Roper, Young Bob Fitzsimmons, Ernie Owens, Ted Snyder, Ted Moore and Benny Touchstone. As a comparison between the respective merits of Cliff and Belanger in their coming battle, both have met Jack Roper, Cliff breaking even with Roper in two starts, while Belanger beat him handily. In his bout with Ernie Owens, who decided Cliff several times, Belanger again has the edge in dope on Cliff, having dropped a close one to Owens, after having hit on the floor

for a count. All of which seems to indicate that Cliff will have his hands full in the coming bout.

GOOD LAUNCH INLANDER BURNT TO WATER'S EDGE

Mr. and Mrs. Don Crerar Have Alarming Experience When Their Launch Takes Fire

Mr. and Mrs. Don Crerar had a distressing experience yesterday, when, on a picnic to Mel-lakalla Bar, their boat, the well known "Inlander" and a recent winner at the Yacht Club races, took fire and burnt to the water's edge.

As is their usual custom, Mr. and Mrs. Crerar left about noon yesterday to spend the day on the water and had with them their infant son and little Miss Attack, aged eight years. The weather was calm although slight showers were experienced. About 6 p.m. heavier clouds than usual yesterday loomed up on the horizon and it was thought better to have supper on the boat rather than on the beach. The party pulled out to the launch and supper was all prepared. By this time the rain was coming down and the canvas curtains of the cockpit were fastened to keep off the weather and everything was snug for the moment. Water for tea had been boiled on the ship's Primus stove which was still burning and only about three mouthfuls of Mrs. Crerar's famous salad had been swallowed when there was an explosion in the forward cabin and flames burst forth.

Don in his bare feet, grabbed the Pyrene extinguisher and subdued the fire for the time being, while Mrs. Crerar got the children into the dinghy, but between the fumes from the gasoline and the extinguisher in the confined space, Don was compelled to come out gasping for air and let the boat burn.

To the Rescue
Hailing the first passing launch, Don was surprised to see his signals unanswered, and apparently unobserved, and two hours later Bill Wait in his "Irene" and Alex. Rix in the "Ruth," the last boats from Turg-well last night, observed his plight and came to the rescue. By this time the good launch "Inlander" in which so many jolly parties had voyaged during the past few years, was burnt beyond rescue, although it was managed to tow the smouldering hull above low water mark on the bar, thereby making the salvaging of the engine possible.

Wet with rain and salt water, Mr. and Mrs. Crerar and the two children came home in the "Ruth," having saved only one blanket of all their possessions on the launch, but apparently none the worse other than feeling the effects of the fumes of the gasoline and pyrene mixed, which makes a deadly mixture, and that Don burned his big toe, but didn't know it until he got home.

TRAIL RIDERS BACK AT JASPER AFTER A POW WOW AND RIDE

JASPER, July 26.—The Jasper squadron of the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies arrived back at Jasper Park Lodge at the week-end from their first annual pow wow and ride, a ride that carried them 70 miles through the heart of Jasper National Park and one of the most scenic portions

of the Rockies. Saturday night the meeting came to an official close with a dance at the home of Major Fred Brewster, commander of the squadron.

The ride back to Jasper carried the squadron from the base camp on Big Shovel Pass through the Athabasca Valley, past Buffalo Prairie and back to Jasper Park Lodge. Several of the party stopped for a few hours at Wah-basso Lake and enjoyed some trout fishing, sufficient rainbows being caught to provide every member of the party with a mountain trout breakfast.

All those who were in the graduating class were presented with their buttons Saturday and several have added sufficient to their mileage to win the silver and gold buttons of the organization.

BROOKLYN GIRL MADE BIG CLIMB

Feat of Miss Rosalie Caubert, School Teacher, is Outstanding Performance

JASPER, July 26. — To a Brooklyn school teacher, Miss Rosalie E. Caubert, falls the honor of being the first woman to ascend the peak of Mount Leah, one of the mountains in the range which border the shores of Maligne Lake in the heart of Jasper National Park.

Nine months of the year Miss E. Caubert spends in grade one A in school number 175, teaching the kiddies of Brooklyn their alphabet. The other three months she spends in the Canadian Rockies and with three or four exceptions, has travelled more miles on horseback in the mountains than any known white woman. She has won the 500 mile button of the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies and has several hundred miles toward her thousand mile button which she hopes to win before the year is over.

Remarkable Climb
Her climb of Mount Leah is somewhat remarkable from an Alpine standpoint. When she decided to make the attempt on the summit she was taking part in the annual pow wow and ride of the Jasper Squadron of Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies and she had not come equipped or mountain climbing. However, at Maligne Lake, she discovered that one of the cooks was Jean Webber, an expert Swiss guide, who accompanied the Japanese party which made the successful attempt on Mount Albert last year and after talking things over with him, she engaged his services and undertook to make the ascent.

Wednesday morning they left the Trail Riders' camp and by noon were seen more than half way up the slopes of Mount Leah. At four o'clock they reached the summit and recorded their climb thereby leaving a record of their ascent in a tin which they enclosed in a rock cairn on the peak. They then started down and arrived back in camp about 8.30 the same evening.

Outstanding Feat

Mount Leah has an elevation of more than 9,000 feet and is snow-capped. To undertake such an ascent without the use of ropes, pikes, proper shoes or the other regular paraphernalia of the Alpinist was in itself an adventure which few experienced climbers would care to make but to accomplish the climb under
