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## SCHEME TO ORGANIZE WORLD WHEAT POOL

### FIRST BIG BREAKAWAY FROM BRITISH COAL STRIKE IS ANNOUNCED TODAY

#### World Wheat Pool Plan to be Considered at a Conference Kansas City

WINNIPEG, Aug. 20.—The latest thing in co-operative marketing is a proposal to form a world wheat pool to control prices and see that there is proper distribution of the product. Plans for a definite organization will be submitted to the second international conference of wheat pools at Kansas City on March 16, 1927. The venue for the conference was selected yesterday by a provisional committee appointed at the World Pool meeting in St. Paul last winter.

The program of the meeting will be largely drawn up from the experiences of Canadian pool officials who have actively interested themselves in the matter and who will take the lead in matters of organization. Already delegates of the Canadian pools have been sent to Argentina and other wheat producing countries with a view to lining them up with the movement.

It is claimed by those in a position to know that wheat manipulation has in the past been undertaken by the big dealers for the purpose of making gains for themselves and at the expense of the growers. This it is planned to prevent.

#### NEW TARIFF AT ELEVATORS IS BEING ASKED

VANCOUVER, Aug. 28.—An application was made yesterday to the Grain Board of Canada for a new tariff on the handling of grain in the coast elevators to conform to those at the head of the Great Lakes. The motion was made by owners of grain plants who claimed that under the present tariff grain elevators of Vancouver do not obtain sufficient revenue to operate successfully. They argued that the tariff retarded the development of the port's handling facilities.

#### GEORGIA MAN IS CHAMPION

Flowers Successfully Defends Middleweight Title Against Greb

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Tiger Flowers of Georgia successfully defended the world's middleweight championship last night when he won the decision over Greb of Pittsburgh in a ten round match.

Flowers' victory was by a decisive margin on points but he was forced to withstand a slashing attack by Greb in the last two rounds. It was rough and tumbled fighting from start to finish.

#### ONE MAN KILLED AND ANOTHER INJURED AS SCAFFOLD GIVES WAY

VANCOUVER, Aug. 20.—Robert Pland was killed and Yetta Strom was seriously injured Thursday when a scaffold on which they were working painting a downtown building collapsed, the men falling sixty feet.

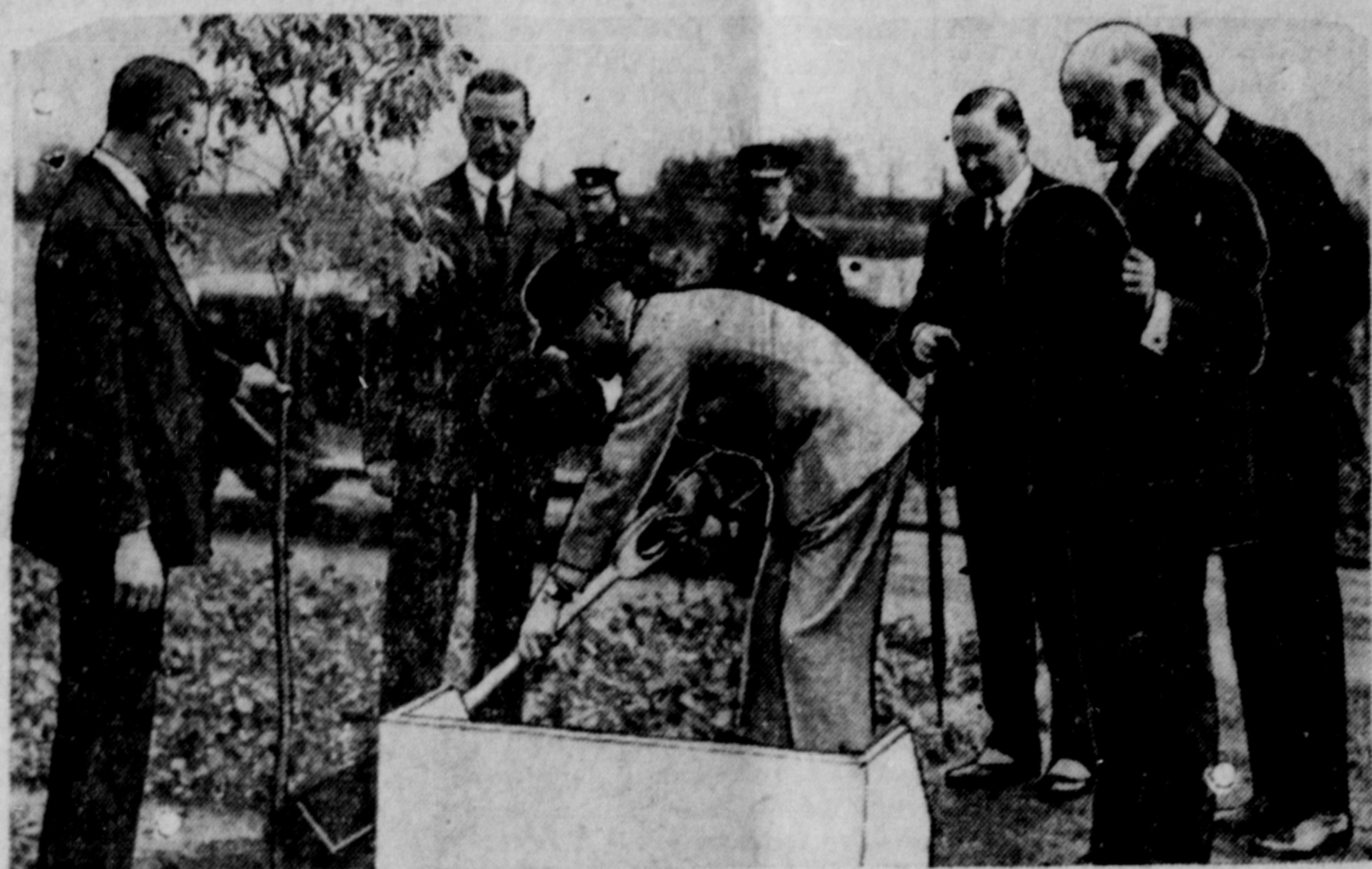

#### GRAIN CUTTING BULKLEY VALLEY IS UNDER WAY

SMITHERS, Aug. 20.—The excellent summer weather of the past couple of weeks has been a great boon to the farmers of the Bulkley Valley and the prospects for a bumper grain crop are now practically assured. Grain cutting is well under way and shocks of grain is a common sight when motoring over the roads in the valley. This year sees the greatest acreage sown to wheat and oats in the history of the valley and the yield per acre promises to be well up to the average or better than that in the older districts of the province.

#### VOLCANO IN ALASKA ACTIVE

Bagoslof Seen by Japanese Steamer Yokohama Maru; Coast Guard to Investigate.

CORDOVA, Aug. 20.—Bagoslof, a volcanic island on the south side of Bering Sea, was in eruption heavily Wednesday, according to reports received here from the Japanese steamer Yokohama Maru, via St. Paul Island. The eruption began at 1 p.m. Tuesday, continuing until 24 hours later. The Yokohama Maru was eleven miles off the island.

The coast guard cutter Haida has gone to Bagoslof, which is 1,100 miles southwest of here.

#### Preparing to Ship Ore from Recently Discovered Mine at Topley to Smelter at Trail

SMITHERS, Aug. 20.—The mining field at Topley is still holding the interest of the mining fraternity of the district and, according to reports brought to town by the discoverer, Frank Taylor, the new find is increasing in prospect as the development goes on.

The tunnel being driven as a cross-cut in the ore body is now in a distance of sixty feet, and the formation is now more solid, with the silver values increasing. Mr. Taylor came to town to make arrangements for the purchase of a compressor to facilitate the driving through the hard rock and reported that an assay made last Friday of a sample from the face of the tunnel shows the gold value runs about the same as on the surface, that is around \$8, but the silver value is now up to 56 oz.

#### Immense Body

Some idea of the immense body of ore can be gained from the work already accomplished. The showing on the surface was traced for nearly 300 feet and has a decided slant. The tunnel was started at the lower side and at the present face at 60 feet, it is estimated the depth from the surface is 50 feet.

Mr. Taylor made a sample shipment to the smelter at Trail and the report on this states the ore will be given a premium of \$3.53. This is contrary to the general run of ore from this district, which is usually penalized on account of zinc contents.

The Topley ore, however, contains silica, a great asset in fluxing. A grant for road building has been voted by the provincial government and as soon as the road is put into shape, Mr. Taylor intends shipping on a large scale.

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#### Gaines Convicted of Murder of His Daughter Sylvia and Death is the Penalty to Pay

SEATTLE, Aug. 20.—Wallace Gloys Gaines was convicted last night of the murder of his 22-year-old daughter Sylvia here on June 17. The jury was out four hours and on returning fixed the penalty at death.

Gaines collapsed when the verdict was announced and the defence counsel announced that an appeal would be made. The body of Sylvia Gaines, a graduate of Smith College, Northampton, Mass., was found denuded and battered in a grove at the edge of a street on the shore of Lake Washington on the morning of June 17. She left her father's house alone for a walk on the night of the murder after an argument with him. About nine o'clock three persons saw a man near the scene of the murder whom they declared resembled Gaines in stature and build. The state made much of the theory that Gaines slew the girl after she threatened exposure of a clandestine affection existing between them.

#### First Big Break Made in Coal Miners' Strike; Compromise Accepted

LONDON, Aug. 20.—The biggest breakaway of coal miners from the policy of the miners' federation since the strike was called came last night when delegates representing 13,000 men and boys employed in the Bolsover Company's mines in Nottinghamshire accepted a proposal of the owners to resume at the old wage for a seven and a half hour day.

Other owners in this field and in Derbyshire announced their readiness to open the pits on the same terms. Although it is not known yet whether the miners generally will endorse the action of the delegates in the Nottinghamshire field, it is predicted that virtually all concerned eagerly accept the compromise and will commence work forthwith.

Some observers profess to hope that the acceptance of the Bolsover scale means the beginning of the end of the strike.

#### DONAGHY OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN

VANCOUVER, Aug. 20.—Dunald Donaghy, Liberal candidate opposing Hon. H. H. Stevens to Vancouver Centre, opened his campaign last night and received an attentive hearing from an audience that packed the ballroom of the Hotel Vancouver. At the outset, Mr. Donaghy expressed the wish that the campaign should be free from bitter personalities. He dealt with the customs scandal briefly, stating that he was leaving the full discussion of that matter until a more opportune time. He was a member of the customs committee, he said, and he did not intend to take second place to any man in the sincerity with which he would act to have the recommendations of that committee carried out and to run down the officials and business firms or factories which might be defrauding the country." He declared that he was ready to give battle to his opponent if challenged, "I await developments," he concluded significantly.

Mr. Donaghy also dealt with the issues raised by Premier Meighen here and defended the Australian trade treaty which he claimed was being made a "political football."

#### INSURING GRAIN IN LOCAL ELEVATOR

J. H. Smith of Calgary is Visitor in Prince Rupert in That Connection

J. H. Smith of Calgary, manager of the United Grain Growers' Securities Co. and of the Car and General Insurance Co. of England, is a visitor in the city on business in connection with the insurance of grain that will pass through the Prince Rupert elevator. Mr. Smith, who is accompanied by Mrs. Smith, arrived from Vancouver on the Prince George this morning and will proceed by tomorrow morning's train on his return to Calgary.

#### RIVALRY BETWEEN POLITICAL FACTIONS LEADS TO SHOOTING WITH FATAL RESULTS

GOVERNOR IS KILLED  
Streets Crowded as Politicians Fire at Each Other Across Thoroughfare

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 20.—Two deputies were mortally wounded, Colonel Andre Garcia killed, and Tomas Garrido, former governor of the state of Tabasco, was shot in the face in a street battle in the business section of the city. The fighting was the outcome of bitter rivalry between two factions in Congress. The partisans of the opposing sides met in front of the Iturbide Hotel on Madero Ave. and without preliminaries began shooting.

#### JAPANESE WINNERS DAVIS CUP TENNIS GAMES YESTERDAY

MONTRÉAL, Aug. 20.—In the first two games of the Davis Cup contest in the American zone finals played yesterday afternoon, Takachi Sarada of Japan defeated Rogelio Paris of Cuba 7-5, 6-0, 6-3, and Sekiwa Tawara vanquished Vicent Sanel 9-7, 6-1, 6-2.

#### STOCK MARKET RALLIED LATE

After Selling Movement Change Took Place Carrying Some Issues High

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—After going through a heavy selling movement which centred mainly in U.S. Steel, the stock market rallied briskly during the final hour under the impetus of short covering.

Delaware and Hudson were carried seven and a half points upward on a spectacular rise. Several other issues are making good gains. U.S. Steel closed with a net gain of a point and a half.

#### IS NOTHING TO DOUCET CHARGE

Sir Francis Lemieux Found Margaret Not Used for "Joy Rides" as Alleged

OTTAWA, Aug. 20.—The report of Sir Francis Lemieux on his investigation into the Doucet charges concerning the "Margaret" case was issued this afternoon. It states that the investigation did not show any kind of allegation that the vessel was used for "joy cruises" or that Lapointe had been a participant in cruises. The judge states that the incident is closed.
