## YUKON IS NOT LAND OF ICE

DOCTOR FROM MAYO DEFENDS TERRITORY FROM FALSE IMPRESSION GIVEN OF IT

WINNIPEG, Dec. 6.—Yukon territory, as the land of perpetual ice and snow, where men are men and barbers nonexistent, exists only in the feverish brain of the obliging movie director, according to Dr. C. C. Ross, of Mayo, Y.T., who recently passed through Winnipeg en route to his old home in Minnedosa.

He says the Yukon climate is very much the same as that on the prairies, the residents of Mayo wearing similar clothes as prairie citizens and drive their cars all the year around. Of course, it does get somewhat chilly at times, admitted Dr. Ross. Two years ago they had ten days when the official temperature was 69 below zero but such cold snaps are exceptional. Mayo itself is a mining town, being the headquarters of the Treadwell Yukon Company which, last year, brought out ore to the value of nearly \$2,000,000 from their mines in the district.

Although it is 300 miles from the narrow gauge railway which connects Whitehorse city with Skagway, the town has a well equipped hospital, moving picture theatre and a good golf course. Those seeking a diversity of amusements can step from a bridge party to big game hunting in the woods around the town, where nothing lies between them and the Hudson Bay except untamed wilderness.

### COST OF LIVING HIGH

The cost of living in Mayo is high, twenty-five cents is the smallest piece of money used, a hair cut costs a dollar and the price of butter the same price, but wages are in proportion. Radio is a great boom in keeping residents in touch with the events of the day in the outside world, as the newspapers are three weeks old by the time they reach Mayo. Swarms of tourists are visiting the Yukon every summer, according to Dr. Ross, and during the holiday season it is impossible to travel up or down the coast without making reservation weeks in advance.

The big handicap in the development of the territory is the lack of transportation facilities, especially in


