DYBHAVN HOME VISIT TO EAST

Says Fred Stork Was Down With Flu; Weather Cold and Wet

John Dybhavn returned to the city on yesterday afternoon's train following a trip East in the course of which he attended the annual meeting of the Biological Board and took up various matters pertaining to the fisheries after which he visited New York and Boston on business, returning home by way of Toronto and Chicago.

The principal business carried on at the meeting of the Biological Board has already been published in the Daily News. Mr. Dybhavn adds that it was decided to continue investigations into the salmon fisheries at the Cultus Lake hatchery near Chilliwack and, in addition, it was arranged that observations would be taken at Eagle River on Shuswap Lake to ascertain what numbers of fish if any return there following plantings that were made a few years ago.

Arrangements were also made to continue investigations as to the possibility of stocking the lakes in Jasper Park with sporting fish and it is expected that five men will be engaged in the work there this year. Preliminary work was started last summer.

The fresh fish market was thrown out of gear as a result and western fresh halibut was down as low as 5c a pound wholesale while mackerel itself was selling at 2c. The market condition was becoming readjusted, however, as the mackerel run receded.

Mr. Dybhavn happened to be in New York on the morning of the arrival of the Crown Prince of Sweden who is on a trip of the world. The event was hailed with decorations in the city and was given great prominence in the newspapers of the metropolis. The Crown Prince of Sweden is a student of science, being particularly interested in archaeology.

HERTZOG ON GROUP UNITY

Says it Failed at Locarno and Independence Under Common King Only Method

CAPETOWN, June 8.—General Hertzog made an important pronouncement regarding Dominion status at Stellenbosch University.

The Premier maintained that the Dominions had never yet received the full international independence to which they were entitled under the grant of self-government, but that they had always been subordinated to the British Government until the signature of the Versailles Treaty, when their international independence had been recognized. Even after that, however, the Dominions had hesitated to put their new status to practical test, owing to their fear that the disruption of the Empire would follow, and they had accordingly compromised by creating the doctrine of "group unity," under which the British Empire was to take decisions on matters of foreign policy as a unanimous group, and not as a member of separate entities.

Doctrine Failed

General Hertzog declared that this doctrine had utterly failed in practice, and pointed to Locarno, where, he alleged, the Dominions had not been properly represented and the British Government had gone its own way without consulting them. He expressed his gratification at Great Britain's attitude at Locarno, which had meant her rejection of the "group unity" idea as being not feasible in practice, and had enabled the Dominions to get back to a sound basis by returning to the Versailles Treaty and claiming the international independence thereby accorded them.

Cordial Co-operation

In conclusion, General Hertzog affirmed that the only link between the Dominions and Great Britain was the personal bond of a common King, but he added that, in their own interests, international independence would mean closer and more cordial co-operation. In order to obtain the full international effect, however, something more was required than a mere declaration of constitutional rights among themselves. That declaration would have to be formally communicated by them to the outside world.
