

VALENTINO TO MARRY NEGRI

Affection of Stars is Mutual But Matrimonial Plans Not Made

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., June 8.—Rudolph Valentino yesterday admitted that he would not permit the forfeiture of a mere \$15,000 to interfere with his possible plans for matrimony.

He denied, however, that there is any basis for telegraphed reports from New York that he and Greta Negri would be married within ten days.

"It is entirely impossible," he said. "Nothing is farther from our thoughts. If we planned to be married even in the remote future we should certainly be only too happy to announce it."

Birth Party
The New York dispatches declared Valentino and Miss Negri had telegraphed their intentions to friends in the East soon after the birthday party which Miss Negri gave in Valentino's honor last Saturday night and at which Hollywood's elite was plentifully represented.

"We made no such announcement," said Valentino, "nor did we discuss any such plans." Asked point-blank about the general impression in some sections that Miss Negri's avowed affection was not reciprocated, Valentino became indignant.

Untrue Impression
"That is an unfortunate and entirely untrue impression," he said angrily. "It is the basest falsehood. My regard for Miss Negri is of the highest character. I wish to state once more that my affection is sincere, and that I consider Miss Negri one of the most charming and delightful women it has ever been my pleasure to meet."

"It is entirely true that our affection is mutual, but matrimonial plans are still a matter of the future." "Reminded of his \$15,000 wager, recorded in Paris, that he would not marry before 1930, Valentino shrugged lightly. "A mere matter of money would never interfere with the course of our romance," he said. "As a matter of fact, any conceivable amount of money would be infinitesimal compared to winning Miss Negri's affection."

NOTES OF FISHERMAN USED BY DEPARTMENT FOR USE OF MARINERS

Description of West Coast of Queen Charlottes by Capt. A. Freeman issued by Government

VANCOUVER, June 8.—Some very useful hydrographic notes on the harbors and inlets on the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands are contained in a notice to mariners just issued by the department of marine and fisheries at Ottawa.

The notes, filling a pamphlet of 15 pages and accompanied by a sketch forming a preliminary description of the yet uncharted portions on this part, were prepared by Captain A. Freeman, master of fishing vessels operated from here by the New England Fish Company and the Canadian Fishing Company.

Captain Freeman has spent nearly 30 years in these waters and also made a special trip in order to examine the harbors and inlets as to their practicability for salmon fishing and also to make observation of their potential water power. This trip was made in 1917 for his company, and he has also made more than 50 voyages while fishing for halibut from Cape Saint James to Langara Island and has fished from close to shore out to 300 to 400 fathoms of water. Details of all the bays and inlets from Houston Stewart channel on the south to Frederick Island in the north are given on the chart.

It is equally well known that Mr. Bowser is biding his time with a compactly organized following and the control of the party funds. Leon Ladner has not made any formal announcement, but friends are working for him; and they claim to have the assurance that if sufficient support is forthcoming, he will be ready to make the change.

Time Favors Youth
About "Pat" Maitland there is a good deal of uncertainty. He has a very strong support, but it is possible that, in view of his youth, he will prefer to wait his turn. Time, it is conceded, is in his favor.

Mr. Fulton is probably quite unaware of the consideration that is being given him. It is not believed that he has any desire to get back into the hurly burly of politics. But he is very conscientious and his strong sense of duty might lead him to respond to the urgent call of his party.

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Choice of Dominion Capital To Be Celebrated

In the late summer of 1826 Lieutenant-Colonel John By, of the Royal Engineers, selected the spot where the Rideau Canal should enter the Ottawa River, and in so doing settled the site of what afterwards became the capital of the Dominion of Canada. The centenary of this event is being marked this coming August by a celebration which is expected to be national in character. The Dominion Government has already intimated its intention, not only of taking part, but of signaling the occasion by extension of its works for the beautification of the capital. The celebration itself will include historical pageantry and will draw from the western plains a spectacular "Stampede" as illustration of one of the historical phases of the development of that broad section of the Dominion.

In making his journey up the Ottawa, Colonel By was not planning for the capital of a Dominion but striving to strengthen the defences of one of the outposts of the British Empire. "During the war of 1812-15," says Harnett P. Hill, in a brief history of the construction of

the Rideau Canal, "the British authorities experienced much difficulty in attempting the defence of the western part of the province. This was owing to the difficulties of transporting men and supplies from Montreal to Kingston, because of the rapids on the St. Lawrence River. They were also faced with the danger of a U. S. army blocking progress up the river by seizing some of the islands near Kingston. The cost of transport from Montreal to Kingston was also excessive, being fifty-four shillings per cwt.

This was the problem which Col. By came out to Canada to solve. He had spent nine years in this country after 1802, when he had been entrusted with the construction of the Martello towers at Quebec and the rebuilding of the Citadel, and he had also superintended the construction of the Cedars Canal near Montreal. The task of building the canal to connect the St. Lawrence and the Ottawa Rivers, 126 miles in length, through uninhabited country, was gigantic at that stage of the development of the country, and its successful completion stamps its builder as an engineer of high rank.

The coming of railways has superseded it and rendered it practically useless as a carrier of traffic; but it rendered valuable service in earlier days for the settlement of the Province of Ontario, both east and west. Three years after Bytown became Ottawa, it was chosen as the capital of the old Province of Canada.

The centenary celebration this summer will last two weeks, from August 16 to 28. The first week—August 16 to 21—will be devoted particularly to the centenary program, which will include an historical pageant illustrating outstanding periods and events in the history of the capital. During the same period the Edmonton Stampede will give a daily program; while arrangements are also being made for holding the "Rudder" International Power Boat races for two days of that week. Plans are not fully completed for the celebration, but among other proposals under consideration are the erection of a monument to Colonel By. The Dominion Government is also preparing plans for the extension of the Driveway which is such an attractive feature of the city.
