RATE OF PAY FOR SUBSTITUTE IS REDUCED BY BOARD

The school board decided last night to reduce the rate of pay for substitute teachers. Instead of the \$6 per day that is now paid for all substitute work, in future \$6 will be paid for High School substitutes, \$5 for the Entrance and manual training classes and \$4 for the lower grades as well as the domestic science department.

The new scale is based on that now prevailing in North Vancouver. The matter was brought up by H. B. Rochester, chairman of the board, who was of the opinion that the scale of \$6 for substitutes was too high.

It is estimated that a saving of about \$100 annually will be made with the new scale.

DIFFICULT KEEPING DISEASE GERMS ALIVE

California Graduate Student Has Task Feed Them on Egg and Beef Serum

BERKELEY, April 9.—Keeping alive diphtheria and tuberculosis germs is one of the tasks of Anthony Sallie, graduate student, who is seeking a doctor's degree at the University of California.

Bacteria must be had for experimental purposes and under Sallie's care are approximately one hundred varieties.

No epicures are more exacting in their diet requirements than these wards of his—the invisible enemies of the human race. The harder germs will thrive in a medium of beef infusion and other ingredients, with Japanese agar or gelatine added to make the solution solid.

Among these are the staphylococcus, which causes boils, and the typhoid bacteria.

The pneumonia germ and the streptococcus, which causes sore throat, are fed agar and blood. More delicate germs must have an egg or beef serum.

Temperature is a vital consideration in the "culture" of germs, for virtually all are killed at 60 degrees or less.

STANLEY NEWMAN GIVES ANOTHER FINE DISPLAY OF BILLIARD PLAYING

Making a better showing than he did on the night previous and playing an all around splendid game, Stanley Newman, the English professional billiard player, defeated George McElmoyle at the Grand Terminal Club last night by 800 to 484 after having spotted him 400. This means that McElmoyle, who was by no means playing up to his old form, made only 84 points while Newman scored 800.

There were 21 innings and Newman made the high average of 38.09 with breaks of 207, 104 and 116. McElmoyle's high break was 43 and his average, 4.00.

The fourth had not been chosen last night. Tomorrow evening, the British champion will play Sgt. Jebson and on Sunday night Charles Balagno.

After Newman had displayed his repertoire of trick shots last evening, the audience was given the opportunity of trying for the high break with a set of trick balls. The competition was amusing and Fred Pyle ran seventeen which will be hard to top with the queer balls. Two cues will be presented at the end of the week to the two persons making the highest breaks during the competition with these balls.
