DOUKHOBORS MAY UNITE

Efforts Being Made to Bring all Colonies in Canada Under One Control

REGINA, April 9.—The movement for amalgamation of all Doukhobor colonies in Western Canada under one control, is rapidly gaining favor, according to M. W. Cazakoff, acting president and general manager of the Christian Community of Universal Brotherhood Limited.
 All existing colonies, he states, have already sanctioned the proposed plan of amalgamation.
 According to Mr. Cazakoff, Peter Veregin's arrival in Canada some time in May, will see the amalgamation effective. He declared that under the new order hundreds of thousands of dollars will be saved for Doukhobors in the West.

Co-operative stores, warehouses, flour mills, elevators, ranches and sawmills, were only a few of the institutions that Mr. Cazakoff prophesied would come into being this year.
 The acting president said that despite the hardships experienced by Doukhobor communities in 1924, owing to crop failure, last year's crop had put them once more in sound financial condition.

The advent of Peter Veregin, he asserted, would see many

OFFICER DRUNK LOSES COMMAND

Colonel Williams Put on Real Party at Hotel and all Became More or Less Intoxicated

SAN DIEGO, April 9.—Brigadier General Smedley Butler was the guest of honor at the house of Colonel Alexander Williams whom he succeeded as commanding officer of the marine corps. The result has been that Colonel Butler has reported Colonel Williams and other officers in attendance for drinking intoxicating liquors.
 It appears that cocktails were served before the dinner and that other drinks were indulged in. Following the dinner General Butler left and the officers and ladies went to the Coronada Hotel where they "put on a real party," with the result that everybody became more or less intoxicated.
Unbecoming an Officer
 Butler then sent his charges to Rear Admiral Robertson, commanding the eleventh naval district and today they were forwarded to Washington. The Butler charges were that Colonel Williams was "intoxicated and acted in a manner unbecoming an officer." Butler also reprimanded all the officers who attended the party. He told them they had violated the eighteenth amendment to the constitution.
 Several affidavits were sent to Washington with the charges, all setting forth that Williams was intoxicated. Other affidavits denied this. The regulations require that an affidavit of a navy physician shall be furnished with charges of intoxication and there was no such affidavit filed at district headquarters.
Loses Job
 Williams was summarily removed from command of the fourth regiment of marines to which he reverted when Butler assumed command of the marine base.

ASKING A HOSPITAL FOR ALASKA INSANE

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 9.—Construction of a hospital either in Washington or Oregon for the insane of Alaska is urged in the annual report of Governor George A. Parks, of Alaska. In this report which the secretary of the interior transmitted to the Senate, it is pointed out that the construction of such hospital was authorized last year but that no appropriation was provided.
 Governor Parks said that the present method of caring for insane patients at private institutions is unsatisfactory and that it meets with great opposition in Alaska. In explaining his request that it be built either in Oregon or Washington, the governor gives as his reason the fact that the climate there would be better for the mentally defective and that the institution could be built and maintained at less cost.
 It is estimated by the executive that a suitable hospital built in Alaska would cost \$630,000 and that it could be constructed in the states for \$500,000.

HOCKEY CHANGES ARE SUGGESTED IN EAST

Edmonton Team May be Sold and Victoria Players Talked of for National League
 MONTREAL, April 9.—Hockey circles are convinced that Kenny Mackenzie is here to sell the Edmonton hockey team, if possible. This is the view taken by the sporting editors and the local hockey news experts. The Montreal Gazette's sporting editor

puts the general view as follows:
 "The presence of the western magnates here, he says, has led to much conjecture and many rumors. Kenny Mackenzie, owner of the Edmonton team, is admittedly ready to place his club on the market in the east and it is thought that he may negotiate with some of the eastern United States cities, to enter either the N.H.L. or the new minor circuit that is being fostered by Le. Dandurand of the Canadiens and Boston interests.
 Saskatoon Skeiks are similarly now ready to change their home of operations as was pointed out early last winter, but denied emphatically by western hockey leaders at the time. There are apparently two roads open for the Saskatoon club, either to join the proposed new league as a unit, or to unite with the Canadiens in the National Hockey league, both of which plans have been mooted.
 Other western players are likely to be seen in the east next year. It is understood that both Frederickson and Halderson would like to play in the National Hockey league.
 Capt. H. G. Barrington and Capt. W. H. Barrington of the Barrington Transportation Co. are passengers aboard the Princess Mary this afternoon returning north in anticipation of the navigation season on the Stikine River which is now opening.
 Members of the crew of the Whitehorse, first of the White Pass & Yukon Railway & Navigation Co.'s steamers to start navigation on the Yukon River between Whitehorse and Dawson, are going north aboard the Prince Mary this afternoon.
