ence to go home. She asked for the clothing that had been removed and he, to tease her, said he thought he would keep them. Then she walked off "in a huff" and he tried to follow her and give her the clothing. Then he heard a car coming and he picked up his coat hurriedly and caught a ride. The girl had not been hit, abused or treated intentionally rough. The statement that he had threatened to "biff her on the jaw" was false, also the remark about what would happen if she didn't "come through."

After he had gone home and gone to bed, Sergeant McGlinchey telephoned and told him that he had been accused of tearing a girl's clothing off. As a result of the conversation with the officer, accused went to the park, got the girl's clothing where they had been left, and took them to the station.

Showing Affection

Accused was cross-examined by Mr. Johnson as to his intentions in putting his arm around the girl. On one occasion this had been to hold her on a swing and show his affection. Their conduct on the night in question might have appeared unseemly but it was "just for fun."

"I suppose it was showing your affection," suggested His Lordship. Asked by Mr. Johnson if the girl had ever encouraged him to be familiar, witness said she had never objected to his being around. The girl had not been manhandled by the three accused on the night in question. The girl had smoked cigarettes with other boys in the park previously.

Lawrence Capstick was then placed on the stand. His evidence was similar to that of

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girl's story and that of the accused. Even the crown witnesses had admitted that the girl could have gone away any time she had chose. Her evidence on this point contradicted that of other witnesses in the case.

Why then had the girl lied asked Mr. Gonzales? Because she had not expected when she made her complaint to the police that the matter would go any further and, when she found proceedings started against the boys, she had made up a worse story to save her own name. If she had been carried to the table and gagged and smothered, why had not the assault been completed? Could intent on the part of the boys be believed when, two seconds after the occurrence, they had gone off to a dog fight? Later the girl was seen, apparently contented, still seated with Mackenzie on the table. The fact of the matter was if the clothes had been returned by Mackenzie, the boys would never have been in court today. No one was more sorry regarding what happened to the accused boys themselves. In considering the story of the girl and of the accused boys, Mr. Gonzales asked the jury only to be fair, reasonable and last but not least, human.

Mr. Johnson

Mr. Johnson, in addressing the jury, emphasized the fact that there was no conflict or question as to an assault having been committed. As to whether or not there had been intent it was for the jury to decide. This would guide in differentiating between the first and second counts on the indictment. If one of the boys was guilty of such intent and the others had raised no objection then all were equally guilty. Mr. Johnson asked the jury to consider the probability of the girl's story and that of the accused.

Mr. Johnson claimed the character of the girl had never been attacked and two of the boys were strangers to her. From the evidence the jury had heard the girl was normal, had been in domestic service for four years and had been in the habit of going out and amusing herself. Any woman was entitled to go out and stay in the park until 2 o'clock in the morning without being approached and insulted by anyone. When the girl screamed "For God's sake Dave, help me" it had been a yell which meant something more than an ordinary scream. He did not think it was a very insignificant fact that the girl had made a statement to the effect the boys had stated that if she did not "come through" in ten minutes that they would come back. If it had all been a joke why had the girl telephoned to McGlinchey. If it was a joke there would have been no object in telephoning the police. Had the defence satisfied the jury that the girl had been a consenting party? Even were the girl a bad character that did not justify the assault. There had been no single incident brought forward by the defence to show that the girl was in any way immoral. The fact that she had smoked a cigarette and obtained cigarettes from men was no particular slight on the girl. "Ever if she smoked a packet of cigarettes it did not follow that she was to be attacked" exclaimed counsel.

Judge's Charge

Mr. Justice W. A. MacDonald, in charging the jury, repeated the indictments with intent charging the accused with having assaulted Florence Morrison and the lesser count of having committed an indecent assault. His Lordship defined the code of law to the jury and charged them each with their full responsibility in the matter of arriving at a verdict. They had to consider whether the accused were acting in concert and whether the act of two or three would implicate and carry the guilt to the third person. The law required the judge to instruct the jury to be particularly careful in reviewing the surrounding circumstances of the case. It was for the jury to decide whether the surrounding circumstances were true or false.

There were several tests to apply. One of these tests was the story told by the complaining woman. Had she made the complaint within a reasonable time after the occurrence? The girl upon arriving home that night and finding her master and mistress absent had resorted at once to the police complaining

of the occurrence. It was true that in that complaint she had only mentioned the fact that her clothes were taken from her without having mentioned what they happened to be. Then, later that evening, when Mr. McLeod came home, she complained along the same lines adding something about insult being offered to her. It was for the jury as men to determine whether the young girl was telling the truth or not. What other means was there of testing the credibility of her story? One was that witness was a girl of good character. Another matter to come in for consideration was in the shape of the bruises on the girl's body testified to by Dr. Tremayne. He presumed the jury would accept the doctor's evidence. These were matters for the determination of the jury themselves. If there was any reasonable doubt in the case the accused were entitled to the benefit of such doubt. That was their right in the eyes of the law. The question of sympathy had to be left entirely aside.

The jury retired at 12:05 p.m. to consider their verdict and court adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon.
