### IS GOVERNOR Keystone Mining Company at Alice Arm Resumes Operations on Silver City Side of Water

ALICE ARM, June 9-The first operations on a large scale and looking towards the development of the properties on the east or Silver City side of Alice Arm were initiated the week by the resuming of operations by the Keystone Mining Company.

The Keystone Mining Company was incorporated in 1923 to take over and work a group of seven claims owned by G. W. Morley and associates on Roundy Creek about two miles from tide water. Some work was done in 1924, but financial diffi-

culties with attendant litigation tied up the property and no work was done in 1925. However, there has been a re-organization of the company, the litigation has been settled and the company is now ready to go ahead upon a campaign of large scale development work, looking toward aclive mining.
