PRINCE GEORGE MILL TO GO AHEAD AT ONCE

Work to be Rushed Says Paper Published in That Young and Progressive City

Archie McGregor, engineer in charge of J. D. McArthur's sawmill undertaking, arrived in the city on Sunday evening's train accompanied by A. J. McLean, says the Prince George Citizen. He says it is Mr. McArthur's intention to rush the work of building the sawmill on the Hudson's Bay addition as rapidly as possible. The necessary preliminary is the building of the mill spur which will connect up the mill site with the Canadian National Railway system. This will be taken in hand at once and will be commenced as soon as men and teams for the work can be secured. Preference will be given to the owners of local stock on the spur construction, but if the required number cannot be secured the horses will be brought in from Alberta.

Mr. McGregor says it is not the intention of Mr. McArthur to move his big Edmonton mill to this city, as there is still plenty of material available for this mill in its present location. The mill to go in here will be a modern one in every respect, and will have a cutting capacity of at least 150,000 feet board measure on a ten-hour shift.

The erection of the McArthur mill and the construction of the necessary river improvements and millpond will be the largest enterprise undertaken in the city since its incorporation, and should result in a marked improvement in local conditions as soon as it is got under way.
