

**FOREST FIRE WORST HISTORY OF ALBERTA**

Trappers Blamed For Carelessness in Not Putting Out Camp Fires.

EDMONTON, Aug. 21.—Forest fires in Alberta this year have been the worst in the history of the province in the opinion of Axel Smith, one of the pioneer and most experienced woodsmen in the west. The greater portion of the responsibility for this condition, he lays upon the shoulders of the tenderfoot trapper.

"In my travels to the north of Edmonton," said Mr. Smith, "I find that nearly all residents living in the woods are more or less interested in trapping during the winter, catching fox and coyotes and in the latter part of the season around every little lake or slough, muskrats. Here is where the trouble starts for the fire rangers.

**Old Trappers Careful**

"These tenderfoot trappers have no idea of the danger of leaving a fire burning. Their one object is to get as much fur as they can regardless of results, and many an honest trapper has had to abandon his old stamping ground and seek new fields on account of the destruction wrought by these embryo trappers.
