BOTH POLITICAL LEADERS CONTINUE CAMPAIGN WITH UNABATED VIGOR

Liberal Leader Promises More Tax Reductions if Is Returned to Power

TIMMINS, Aug. 21.—The Liberal leader, Right Hon. W. L. McKenzie King's return to Ontario was marked by the busiest of his campaign. Brief platform station meetings were held at various places and last night a meeting was held here. The Robb budget with its tax reductions was the chief subject of discussion, but the constitutional issue was also dealt with. "I need not come to you with prophecy. I have only to look to the past year," said the former premier. "Everyone in Canada has benefitted directly from the tax reductions made by the last Liberal Government, as Mr. Robb has stated on other platforms."

Mr. King promised that if the Liberals were returned to power, further taxation would be taken off.

ANOTHER REBELLION IN SOUTH AMERICA

Rebels Evacuate Quezalgua, Burning Part of Town—San Marcos Reoccupied by Government.

MANAGUA, Aug. 21.—The mayor and several non-combatants are reported to have been killed when rebel forces evacuated Quezalgua, burning part of the town, including the largest distillery in Nicaragua.

The government forces re-occupied San Marcos after a sharp skirmish in which rebel losses were severe.

The government is granting no exemptions in recruiting troops. Two thousand recruits were despatched to reinforce the garrisons throughout the country.

There is no disorder in Managua.

CANCELS FISH TRAP LICENSE

End of Season Has Arrived and Action is Taken by Conservatives

Adam Mackie, Inspector of fisheries here, has received a telegram from Major Motherwell in regard to the fish traps which reads as follows:

"Department advises Premier directs that licenses for salmon trap nets adjacent to northern boundary authorized this year be cancelled forthwith. Understand Canadian Fishing Company has already dismantled one trap and the remaining one will be dismantled this week. Kindly govern yourself accordingly."

It is noted by local fishermen that the fishing season is practically at an end so that the cancelling of the license now means nothing. They state that sockeye fishing ends today and the run of other fish is practically over. The traps would have stopped fishing soon anyway, they say.

MANY CANADIAN HALIBUT BOATS

Total of 197,800 Pounds Was Sold at Fish Exchange This Morning.

Four American and thirteen Canadian halibut boats sold catches totaling 197,800 pounds at the Fish Exchange this morning. The four American vessels sold 87,500 pounds and 13 Canadians 110,300 pounds. Prairies Will Ship as Much Grain This Year as Last as Result of Increased Acreage

WINNIPEG, Aug. 21.—There will probably be just as much wheat shipped from the prairies this year as last, according to the report of the Free Press, Saskatchewan in particular has undergone a remarkable change since the last report and both Manitoba and Alberta have more than held their own, following late rains.

The estimate of crop is based on considerable increased acreage in Alberta and Saskatchewan over last year. This will make up for any deficiency in yield over last season or very nearly so.

Urges Establishment of Silk Fibre Plant in Prince Rupert; Spruce Could be Used in Work

That Prince Rupert offers an ideal site for the establishment of a fibre or artificial silk manufacturing establishment is the opinion of W. R. Bucknall, representative of the C. R. Gregg & Co., firm of wholesale silk and China dealers, who is a business visitor in the city. Spruce wood, one of the main constituents of fibre silk, abounds in the district, and the damp climate, with plenty of fresh water, is another advantage.

In Cornwall, England, Mr. Bucknall states, there is a \$3,000,000 fibre silk plant which is now working to capacity, but is still unable to fill the demand.

J. A. McLeod, British Columbia manager of the C. R. Gregg & Co., which has branches in Vancouver, Toronto, Winnipeg and Yokohama, was also a visitor in the city today making the round trip on the steamer Catala.

STEAMER SANK ON THE LAKE

Four Lives Thought to Have Been Lost But Sixteen Picked up in Lifeboats

CLEVELAND, Aug. 21.—The steamer Harold I. Gerken, pounded by gigantic waves whipped into fury by a fifty mile gale, sank eight miles off Erie, Penna., this morning with the possible loss of four lives. Two lifeboats containing 16 men were picked up but the other boat with four aboard is missing.

The vessel, which was heavily loaded, sprang a leak, and filled quickly.

"Let him alone," observed Mr. Meighen, as the noise quieted down. "I hope the audience don't mind this man, as every man has to earn his pay," and the audience broke into laughter.

Mr. Meighen continued and there were more interruptions.

AIR FORCE MAN LOST HIS LIFE

Plane Crashed in Small Lake in Northern Manitoba When on Forestry Patrol.

BODY HAS BEEN FOUND

Carr Harris Tried to Rise in Seaplane When He Struck a Tree and Fell.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 21.—Missing since his plane crashed at a small lake in Northern Manitoba, near mile 135 on the Hudson Bay Railway, the body of Pilot Bedford Carr Harris, 24 years of age, was recovered from the water yesterday and is now being brought to Winnipeg. According to a radio report received this afternoon at Fort Osborne barracks, the crash occurred Thursday while Carr Harris, who was in command of the Royal Canadian Air Force station at Norway House, 300 miles north of Winnipeg, was engaged in forestry patrol work. He was alone in the seaplane at the time and in attempting to rise from the lake struck a tree and crashed into the lake. An explosion followed which set fire to the machine.

GAINS LIKELY IN ONTARIO

Liberals Behind Progressive Leader and Expect to Elect Him.

TORONTO, Aug. 21.—While it is very early yet to gauge the political opinion of the province, it would seem as if the Liberals are going the right way about the campaign here to make several gains at least. They are swinging in with the Progressives who, until recently, were dominant provincially and among others are supporting former Premier Drury. The result is likely to mean that some Conservatives who were seen in the last House will find themselves nosed out.

VANCOUVER MAN DIES AT WINDSOR, ONTARIO

WINDSOR, Ont., Aug. 21.—Alexander Lahore, 63 years of age, superintendent of the soldiers' settlement board of Vancouver, where he resided for 20 years, died yesterday at a hotel here while spending a holiday.
