FINE SCHOONER VISITING PORT

San Pedro Man With Family En Route to Alaska

One of the trimmest and most modern auxiliary sailing yachts to visit this port in a long while is the "Talayha," owned by Lazard Lippman of San Pedro, California, which arrived yesterday afternoon from the south en route to Ketchikan, Alaska. Mr. Lippman, who owns a large departmental store and real estate business in San Pedro, is accompanied on the trip by Mrs. Lippman and family, Miss Talayha and Master Frank. Capt. Julius Valdez is the master of the vessel and Capt. Ed. Young is acting as pilot. Mr. Lippman is on a leisurely cruise in northern Pacific waters and may go as far north as Juneau. The party will remain in port for a couple of days.

The yacht is 106 feet long with 20 foot beam and is powered with a 50 h.p. full diesel engine and carries a crew of six men. Sufficient crude oil can be carried to give the boat a powered radius of 3,500 miles, and there is storage capacity aboard for 1,500 gallons of fresh water. Some thirty people can be accommodated aboard in addition to the crew. A Delco electric plant furnishes the electricity for heating water in the cabins and bathrooms and also furnishes the power for hoisting the sails and running the anchor winch. The "Talayha" is built upon the exact lines of the famous "Reliance," of which it is a duplicate, and has won several races in the south.

Coming up the coast Mr. Lippman stayed over at Pender Harbor, Swanson Bay, Princess Louise Inlet and Lowe Inlet, enjoying excellent fishing at the latter point. Mr. and Mrs. Lippman were very enthused over the scenery coming up the coast and expressed themselves as delighted with the trip both from a scenic and hospitality standpoint.
