YEAR'S SHOW WIPES OUT FOR-MER YEARS' DEFICITS

OFFICERS ELECTED

and enthusiastic meeting of the Smithers Agricultural and Industrial Association was held in the Municipal Office last Thursday evening and the big success of the last Fall Fair as announced several weeks ago was confirmed by the statements and reports submitted by officers of the association.

The financial statement was naturally one of the most important items of the evening. It showed that there was a net profit of some \$1431, which was indeed remarkable in view of the fact that there was a deficit of practically the same figures on the books at the beginning of the year representing the loss on the 1924 and 1925 fairs. This deficit is now reduced to a capital expenditure in the nature of permanent improvements to the building. This report was received with a hearty vote of thanks to the officers on the Fair Board.

Several matters in the nature of improvements for future fairs were discussed and the meeting granted the Board authority to put a number into effect for next year. One of these is to bring in outside attractions to assist in the way of entertainments.

Authority was also given the Board if they found the circumstances warranted it, to have an eight foot board fence built around the four city blocks on which the Fair Grounds are located. In the election of officers the follow-
