MONTREAL, October 26 .- The provinces of Quebec and New Brunswick bushels, an increase of 124,000 bushels onday experienced the heaviest rain and windstorm in years.

In Montreal, one man was killed and three other persons were seriously as a result of the storm while property suffered heavily. In Quebec City were carried away, steel trestles, telegraph poles and thousands of trees blown down, many districts being without light last night. Hundreds of boats were either piled on the beach or carried down the river.

In New Brunswick, the heavy rains caused the rivers to rise rapidly, som in Fredericton being under water.
