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### World Court Is Now Likely To Succeed.

It was with great satisfaction that people of the English speaking world read of the action of the United States to be a party to the world court. It was an epoch making event. It indicates that at last the big republic is prepared to take its place in the forefront of world politics.

Without the presence of the United States, the court could hardly expect to succeed. So powerful an influence for peace and for advancing civilization would have been a serious loss, were it not present. Now a decision has been reached for the big American republic to take part, we may look forward to results.

The next step, as was suggested in the despatches yesterday, will be for the U.S. to become a member of the League of Nations, an organization which was fathered by one of its own presidents. Some day it will join, because it cannot afford to stay out.

### Success Of Hospital Satisfactory To People.

The success of the Prince Rupert Hospital is something that is pleasing to the people of the city. The institution is well managed, apparently, and is providing the accommodation that the people wish. Value is being received for the money expended, and that is what is required. It is always satisfactory to know that a public institution is giving that service which the public expects.

### Grain Congestion Interior Elevators.

It is to be expected that with congestion in interior elevators we shall soon have news that some grain is coming to the elevator here. Prompt action was taken yesterday by the Board of Trade in regard to the matter and it is probable that something will be heard of it further. It seems queer that the wheat pools should be demanding accommodation and our elevator asking for grain, yet neither be able to connect.

### Experimental Farm Should Be Established.

People of the interior have for many years asked for the establishment of an experimental farm. They need it and successive governments have made promises in regard to it. Now it seems the Mackenzie King government is prepared to act. If this is true it will be good news because promises are always more prolific than fulfillments, among politicians. While it will be difficult to decide on a location for the farm, this should no delay the commencement of the work.

### Fascism Today Is Established In Greece.

Greece is today under a tyrannical government. It is an extension of the fascism of Italy to the adjacent country. It is brought about by the incompetence of the mass of the people and the abuse of the privilege of self government. Here is what the Manchester Guardian says of the new Greek movement: "General Pangalos, who seized the government in Greece last June by a coup d'etat jointly with Admiral Hadjikyriakos, has now made himself dictator, and has received the allegiance of the military commands in the various parts of the country. Greece, he said on Sunday at a banquet of the Republican Guard, had been suffering from 'the experiment of Parliamentary elections'; consequently he would, 'as from tomorrow,' assume all responsibility for a national program, and would rely solely on the armed forces. In a proclamation issued on Monday after a Cabinet meeting, General Pangalos gave as the reason for the step the uncompromising and 'subversive' reaction of Opposition leaders and their antagonistic attitude during the Graeco-Bulgarian incident. M. Roupfos, the Foreign Minister, repeated these charges on Tuesday, and added that the elections must be adjourned, but would be held as soon as possible.

The new dictatorship has familiar characteristics of anti-popular government and of adventurousness in the foreign field. It was preceded by the re-election of the Mayor of Salonika after General Pangalos had relieved him of office, and the Premier's first announcement of his new coup concluded with the statement that in a few months Greece would have a sufficiently powerful navy and the strongest army in the Balkans.

## ROTARY CLUB TO CARRY ON BOYS' BAND

Committee Appointed to Devise Ways and Means of Raising Thousand Dollars

At the luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday afternoon it was decided to assume responsibility for the Boys' Band for a time and plans are laid to finance it for the next six months. Money will be raised by means of a concert or otherwise and the city will be asked for a donation.

In explaining the matter Colonel Nicholls said some organization had to be responsible for the band. Money had been raised in the past for the purchase of instruments and those had disappeared. Now the parents were required to sign a guarantee for each instrument held by the boy.

In order to carry on, Colonel Nicholls said, they would have to raise \$300 for bandmasters' salary at \$50 a month. More instruments were needed. Twelve or thirteen of those now used were owned by the regiment and might be called in at any time. Also several new instruments were needed, which would cost about \$250. In all he reckoned that \$1,000 would be needed and he thought they should be able to raise that much. Last year the city had given \$150 but he thought they should give more than that this year.

A committee consisting of Wallace Orchard, Walter Vance, Earl Barrie, Jim Steen, Jarvis McLeod, and John Dore was formed to devise ways and means for carrying on.

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

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
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
