OTTAWA, July 5 .- Declaring that "the serious question arises as to whether Parliament has been legally and constitutionally dissolved seeing there was no prorogation, notwithstanding that both houses of Parliament were in session and His Excellency, the Governor General, was present at the capital at the time." Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King last night issued a statement on the constitutional question.
