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# LIVELY SCENE IN BRITISH HOUSE OF LORDS

## FRED STORK CONFIDENT MACKENZIE KING GOVERNMENT WILL BE STRONGER

### British House of Lords is Wakened Up by Labor Members Who Object to Eight Hour Day

LONDON, July 9.—The final stage of the eight hour bill was characterized by amazing scenes in both houses of Parliament last night and demonstrations of a very unusual nature in the Lords, where, for the first time in history, the Closure was applied before the bill was finally passed.

During the debate in the Lords, four Labor peers vigorously opposed the passage of the measure, delaying adjournment long after the usual time, and finally the Marquis of Salisbury, House leader, moved the closure, the Labor peers protesting again and were supported by a crowd of labor commoners listening to the debate from the bar of the Senate, who shouted "Four hours for you, eight for miners."

Finally attendants ejected the unruly labor members to the Commons from the Senate bar. Similar scenes were enacted in the commons later. When Black Rod appeared a labor member moved "that Black Rod be not entertained here this evening."

### Associated Boards of Trade Will Deal With Resolution Regarding Herring Industry.

VICTORIA, July 9.—The entire elimination of Orientals from the herring industry of Vancouver Island will be asked in a resolution from Port Alberni Board of Trade at the convention of the Associated Boards of Trade next month.

At the present time fifty per cent of Orientals are permitted to operate on the east coast and none on the west. The abolition of personal property tax is also advocated in another resolution.

### Australians Are Victors

Beat Worcester County in Cricket Yesterday By 176 Runs and Six Wickets.

WORCESTER, July 9.—The Australians defeated Worcester county yesterday by 176 runs. They declared the second innings at an end after the fall of four wickets. The scores were for the visitors in the first innings, 197 and the second 182 for four wickets.

Worcester scored 120 in the first innings and 83 in the second.

### BISHOP BUNOZ IN BREAKDOWN

Was on Vessel That Was Forced to Return to New York After Sailing Wednesday.

NEW YORK, July 9.—The French liner DeGrasse, which sailed Wednesday, returned to port owing to a breakdown of the port engine.

Among the thousand passengers aboard the big vessel was Bishop Bunoz, of Prince Rupert.

### POSSIBLE END LABOR COUNCIL

At Next Meeting the Question of Whether It Shall Continue to Function will be Debated

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PRIZE FIGHTER DIED AFTER BOUT WITH PAT PATRICK

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WHITTIER, Cal., July 9.—Clarence Johnson, 19 years of age, champion welterweight boxer, died last night following a prize-fight in which he knocked out in the fourth round his opponent Pat Patrick.

The discussion resulted in the passing of a resolution, moved by W. H. Shorridge, and seconded by Mrs. John Viercek, that a petition be drawn up, requesting the repeal of the charge, and that the petition be circulated for signatures in the sections directly affected, sections 2, 5, 6, 7 and 8. The resolution carried unanimously.

A communication from the Toronto Trades and Labor Council asking that a resolution be drawn up for presentation to the Trades Congress of Canada, to the end that the Criminal Code be amended so as to make peaceful picketing legal, was endorsed.

Illegal Hours

It was decided to have the annual celebration of Labor Day, the date being the first Monday in September. The city will be asked to give the Trades and Labor Council exclusive use of Acropolis grounds, for that day.

More complaints have been received about employees in Prince Rupert being called on to work more hours than they should, under the Act. This matter will be taken up and Frank E. Foster, of the Eight Hour Day Board, will be requested to make a visit to the city and take action against those concerned.

The matter of adding further names to the "Unfair List" was considered.

### TIMBER FIRE NEAR NANAIMO

Wind Changed in Time to Save Pumping Station and Logging Camps

NANAIMO, July 9.—Hundreds of acres of valuable timber were destroyed last night by forest fires breaking out near Ladysmith Lumber Company's logging camp twelve miles from here. For a time the city's auxiliary pumping station at Nanaimo Lake and two logging camps were threatened but a change of wind sent the flames into slashings where a large crew is fighting the blaze with the prospect of bringing it under control. No estimate of the loss is available.

### Mackenzie King May Contest Two Constituencies Where He Has Been Offered Nomination

Meighen Cabinet Has Been Formed And Will Be Announced Some Time Today, it is Reported at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, July 9.—The possibility that Ex-Premier King may contest both North York and Prince Albert at the coming general election is rumored here. He has been offered the nomination by Liberals in both constituencies.

In the meantime, it is known that Premier Meighen has pretty definitely decided on the personnel of his cabinet. Those given portfolios have been notified of their inclusion in the cabinet, but it will not be known until today what particular portfolios they will get.

It is stated that the premiers of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia were offered the refusal of portfolios. Quebec and Saskatchewan are the most uncertain provinces with regard to cabinet representation. It is likely the new premier will have to put off the choosing of a Saskatchewan minister until after the election.

### Toric Mine at Alice Arm

### Will Ship Bullion Making Shipments Monthly This Fall

The concentrating mill at the Toric mine at Alice Arm is

now about completed and, depending on the delivery of machinery, should be in operation by the end of August, according to A. G. H. Gerhardi, managing director and consulting engineer for the Consolidated Homestake Mining & Development Co., who is on his way to the mine aboard the steamer Prince George today.

The mill will have a daily capacity of 100 tons and, in order to simplify the problem of shipping, it is proposed to smelt the ore into gold and silver bullion on the ground, making bullion shipments monthly direct to the banks.

Mr. Gerhardi states that half a million tons of ore has already been blocked out in less than 1,000 feet of crosscutting in the Toric mine. On a very conservative basis, the ore is valued at \$12 per ton, although assays over the area have shown a value of over \$22 per ton.

R. D. Escombe who was brought from the Old Country especially for the position, is superintendent of the Toric mine and there are 12 men employed at the present time there.

### NORTH COUNTRY IMPRESSED HIM

Lieut. Governor Bruce Returns to Vancouver After Tour of Central Interior

VANCOUVER, July 9.—Deeply impressed with the possibilities of the lands in the belt of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and with the scenic beauties of the vast district, Lieutenant Governor Randolph R. Bruce and party returned last night from a tour into the central interior portion of the province. Hon. Dr. W. H. Sutherland, minister of public works, left the party at Smithers.

"A Dominion within British Columbia" is how the Lieutenant Governor describes the country north of Lillooet. He expressed amazement at the vastness of the rolling country which he said was "Literally an Empire in itself" and stated his delight at the condition of the roads in the interior. He laid stress on the tourist value of the historical and romantic background on the old Cariboo road.
