VANCOUVER, July 24. - When he S.S. This parcel was shipped at Victoria, and consists of sea lion skins. These are the first shipment to be dispatched to English buyers this season, and number 300 in all, being valued at \$4,500. The skins were secured by the Indians of the Queen Charlotte Islands, and are being sent by local fur buyers to their companies in London, Eng. The skins will be used chiefly in the manufacture of leather goods, and are principally consigned to the firm of C. M. Lampson and Co.

TO TERRACE

Highway Between Two Points is Object of Public Works Department.

VICTORIA, July 24. - As part of the development of a trunk road from Vancouver to Terrace, the provincial department of public works is calling for tenders for a highway bridge over the Quesnel River at Quesnel, replacing the old viaduct at a cost of approximately \$70,-000. It is expected that the contract will be let in a few days.

The installation of the bridge will be carried out to link the central interior with the coast through the use of the new Cariboo Road. It is expected that travel to Prince George, Hazelton and Terrace will show a heavy increase with the opening of the road.
