FEEL COLD SHIVERS PASS THROUGH SPINE IN PHANTOM OF OPERA

Lon Chaney Takes Part of Repulsive Creature But His Face is Hardly Seen.

Suggesting ideas and thrills—rather than persons, faces, or living entities; letting an audience imagine the story rather than flashing it on the screen—this is the strange development in picture production that Rupert Julian and Lon Chaney launched at Universal City in "The Phantom of the Opera," the spectacular super-thriller coming here Friday and Saturday.

Startling in its audacity, the new production suggests the story—always—it never comes right out with a direct narrative told in terms of direct action on the screen; shadows, gesture-fleeting glimpses of its people in weird settings and strange, eerie underground cellars, tell the tale all-ways in terms of thrills. Or rather—they don't tell the tale at all—they just furnish circumstantial evidence from which the audience may deduce the story.

Would the audience accept it or not? No one knew. But in the meantime the strangest experiment ever attempted in picture production was put under way.

Paid Small Fortune
Lon Chaney was paid a small fortune to appear in the picture—but his face was never seen, except in a few flashes. Unprecedented house records in many cities have settled the question of the public acceptance of the unusual, and the unexampled praise of reviewers leaves no room to doubt that the thrills "registered" with the audience. In the New York American, Louella Parsons expressed it in this wise: "Only a person of cast iron nerves could sit through this and not feel cold shivers pass up and down his spine. Compliment Carl Laemmle on its magnificence."

"The Phantom of the Opera," written by Gaston Leroux, tells of a weird, malformed creature, talented with all the mental gifts a man could have—and cursed with all the physical repulsiveness a god of wrath could devise. His face, the author said, could strike terror in the bravest heart.
