WORLD SERIES HIGH FINANCE

THE PERSON NAMED IN

RECEIPTS GO WELL BEYOND MILLION DOLLAR MARK AND SHOULD DO SO THIS YEAR

NEW YORK, Sept. 25 .- The milliondollar world's series apparently is an established affair in baseball. Receipts for the last three major league classics have gone well beyond this mark and with the game's biggest park, the Yankee stadium, available for part of the coming struggle, there is every prospect that the high tide of finance will continue.

The fact that the championships of the past three seasons have run to six or seven games every time has helped swell the "gates" but the odds usually favor the battle going close to the limit. Only one series in over a score of years has been decided in four straight games. that of 1914 when the Braves trounced the Athletics.

SET HIGH MARK

Last year's struggle between the Pittsburgh Pirates and Washington Senators set a new high mark in total receipts. \$1,182,854, although the attendance, 282,830, fell a little below the records of the previous two years. This was because more higher-priced seats were sold in Pittsburgh and Washington.

The 1923 championship between the Yankees and Giants established an attendance mark of 301,430 in six games. It was made possible through the use of the game's biggest two enclosures. and isn't likely to be broken this Fall.


As a young man the King laid the foundation of his reputation as a shot with these guns and still clings to them for sentimental reasons.
