CAPITAL OF TIBET MAY NOW BE ELECTRIFIED

DELHI, Nov. 27.—Messages of mysterious happenings in Lhasa, the capital of Tibet, have been percolating through the wild passes of southern Tibet into Northern India. A report brought by shaggy-haired and primitive Tibetan muleteers states that "somebody who is in league with the Evil One has succeeded in creating lights which outshine the sun at noon."

The explanation seems to be that R. D. Ringang, a young Tibetan nobleman, who has been studying electrical engineering in England, has reached the goal of his ambition; to electrify the "Forbidden City" of Lhasa.

Several months ago Ringang took a shipment of electric light appliances out from England, but nothing had been heard of him since. His purpose was to harness a waterfall near Lhasa and introduce electricity into his native city.

DEMPSEY LOST EYES AS TUNNEY'S FIST FELL LIKE TON OF BRICKS

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Had the Dempsey-Tunney heavyweight fight gone two more rounds, the title would have changed hands by a technical knockout, in the opinion of the bestest champion.

"My two eyes were gone," said Dempsey. "The boys used an overdose of collidin trying to patch up my right eye, and when Tunney's blows landed on the optic I felt as though a ton of bricks had fallen on me."

"Beginning with the tenth, I was almost sightless. If the fight had gone two more rounds, the referee would have been compelled to step in and stop it. Tunney wouldn't have knocked me out, but the referee, realizing that I couldn't have done myself justice with both my eyes out of commission, would have been forced to halt proceedings."

SILENT SYNDICATE SEEKS GAMBLING CONTROL

CANNES, Nov. 27.—Millions of francs are being spent by a mysterious syndicate, which is endeavoring to gain control of the largest gambling establishments in Southern France.

Feverish buying of Cannes Municipal Casino stock had recently pushed the price up to 1,900 francs a share, doubling the former high mark reached last year. Six months ago a raid on Monte Carlo Casino shares boosted the price to over 15,000 francs a share.



CHILDREN'S PARTY SUCCESSFUL AFFAIR


One Hundred and Thirty Kiddies Were Entertained Saturday Night by Hill 60 Chapter
