NEW YORK, December 30 .- "If Great Britain and America work together," said Premier Bruce of Australia at an English Speaking Union lunch in his honor yesterday "there is hope for mankind. If they do not, nothing mankind may devise can possibly

He described Great Britain and the United States as "the world's two greatest nations which should deliberately embark upon a policy of peace, make sacrifices to other nations, lend them money, fight their battles and shoulder their troubles.

"But today," Premier Bruce said, "We are equally misunder-

stood and alike treated with gross ingratitude."

10,000 and 15,000 Mennonites will be brought to Canada next year under the plans of the Monnoglite Settlemen Board, special agent of the board, stated in an interview here.
