PRINCE RUPERT AS OUTLET FOR PEACE COUNTRY

Board of Trade Inquiry is Interesting as Showing Trend in Northern Alberta

The secretary of the Board of Trade has received a letter from the secretary of the Board of Trade of Beaverlodge, Alberta, asking for information in regard to Prince Rupert, which he is answering and which is very interesting as showing how information in regard to this port is spreading.

As a question of a Pacific outlet for the Peace River district will be seriously considered in very near future I would be glad if you would forward all important features concerning the Port of Prince Rupert such as grain handling facilities, harbor frontage, facility in loading vessels, harbor dues, routes to the Orient and the United Kingdom, insurance rates on cargoes, depth of water or any features that would prove that the Port of Prince Rupert is a more attractive shipping point for the Peace River country than any other Pacific port.

Site 50 by 100 Feet Will be Cleared at Seal Cove by the City

The city council, on recommendation of the Board of Works, decided last night to clear a space 50 by 100 feet at Seal Cove where the Gyro Club will erect playground equipment.

EMPLOY ONLY LOCAL LABOR

Formation of "Old Man's Gang" is also Contemplated by Civic Board of Works

That all city work be carried out by local citizens only and that strict instructions to this effect be given all departmental heads was the purport of a report from the Board of Works that was accepted by the city council last night.

A further report from the Board of Works recommending that local old and incapacitated men be placed to work at \$3.50 per day under a good strawboss removing the rock pile on the Aeropolis Hill athletic grounds was laid on the table for a week by the council.

In connection with the latter report, the most of the members of the council concurred with the principle of taking care of old and incapacitated men but the question arose as to whether Aeropolis Hill was the best place to put them. After some discussion, it was decided to lay the matter on the table for a week to permit of the finance committee and the Board of Works conferring on the matter.
