The other two men proceeded into the hotel and one fired at Munson who was still seated, several shots lodging in his body, causing instant death.

Lose Plane and Almost Drown Before Being Rescued

QUEBEC, Aug. 4 .- A hydroplane crash in unchartered waters off Ungava, the crew's desperate struggle to avoid drowning, and a six day fast in 36 the wilderness before being rescued by companions, was the 93 experience of flyers who formed part of an expedition to survey 11 unknown territory for the pro-50 vincial government.

Three hydroplanes were cruis-77 ing off the coast when one of othem developed engine trouble. After signalling the other two the plane started to descend, crashed to the water and was badly wrecked.
