**HIGH SCHOOL AT ELEVATOR**

Staff and Student Body Spent Two Hours Inspecting Grain Plant Yesterday Afternoon

Yesterday afternoon the staff and students of the Prince Rupert High School, at the invitation of D. M. Shearer, superintendent of construction for Carter-Halls-Aldinger Co. Ltd., paid a visit to the terminal grain elevator and were given an insight into the construction and operation of the big facility which proved at once most interesting and instructive. The party included the entire student body of the High School, some 150 strong, under Principal J. C. Brady and his assistants.

Met by Mr. Shearer, the students were divided into groups which were in charge of J. G. Glossop, elevator superintendent; E. Anderson, government weigh man; W. N. Chater, representative of C. D. Hovey & Co. Ltd.; George Skuce of the Western Steel Products Ltd.; Lawrence Sandberg, general carpenter foreman; Fred Porter of the W. H. Monagan Co. Ltd., and James Neville, elevator foreman. The movement of the wheat from the moment it leaves the cars until it enters the ships at the wharf was fully demonstrated to the students. is weighed before being distributed into the bins, were objects of great interest as was the Carter disc in which the various species of grain are separated. The "money-makers," large separators and screeners called for a large share of attention. Quite a rush was made to see the "eyelone" which collects the dust from all quarters and, by an ingenious device, sends it to the outer air.  
The students had no real conception of the height of the elevator until they climbed to the very top and looked over the harbor and town. The offices of the officials who will be in charge were inspected and not even the Mayo spouts were overlooked.  
For the benefit of the students, the machinery was set in motion so that the movement of the grain could be easily followed. Altogether two highly instructive hours were spent in inspection and the thanks of the staff and students are due to Mr. Shearer and the other officials who went out of their way to make the visit one which will be long remembered.

Committee is always of an onerous character. Mr. Perry conducted his duties with outstanding ability and, combined with his industry, his services are of a most valuable and conspicuous character.

"Coming farther west to Omineca, this district is represented by Alex. Manson, attorney-general. Mr. Manson's great ability and untiring industry stand him in great stead in the most onerous office in the administration. The office of attorney general always lends itself to attack by reason of the fact that it is intimately associated with the social life of the people. In fact almost every phase of endeavor is touched in some way, as a consequence of which it is not surprising that the office of attorney general is one of exceptional difficulty in administration.

**New Member**

"Proceeding west, we have Skeena district represented by Dr. Wrinch, who although a new representative in the legislature, is a member of two or three important standing committees, and his work, both in committee and in the House, commands the respect of all associated with him. He is a man of sterling integrity, conscientious, industrious and well-balanced.  
"Coming farther west, Prince Rupert is represented by the Minister of Lands, of whom I will say nothing any more than that I have very frankly, on several occasions, told him what I think of his golf game.  
"Proceeding north and west, we have Atlin represented by Bert Kergin. Bert Kergin is deputy whip of the Liberal party and a member of several committees of the House, being secretary for the public accounts committee, one of the most trying and difficult positions of any of the committees. As Deputy Whip his work was valuable to the party he represents. Upon the whip and deputy whip, especially with a House as closely divided as ours, lies an exceptionally heavy task. Bert Kergin is possessed of a splendid fund of that rare commodity—good common sense, is industrious and diplomatic. I don't think that Atlin will ever get at better representative.

**The Opposition**

"Of the work of the Opposition in the House I will not individualize, but I think that a great deal of the efforts of the opposition was destroyed by a very evident desire upon the part of a considerable number of the members to add to their prestige. Each member seemed to be vying with the other to impress upon the House and country the high character of his work, and longing eyes were cast across to the seats on the other side of the House by these ambitious gentlemen. One or two men of ability on the other side of the House were more modest and I think added more to their prestige than did those who made a very obvious attempt so to do.  
"Our Government has come under very severe censure from time to time and a very considerable amount of abuse and misrepresentation has taken place, and we may be sure more will follow. Attack after attack has been made upon a number of undertakings which the government started for the benefit of returned soldiers. At the time when these works were undertaken, men were returning from the front in large numbers, and when it was necessary that something should be done to enable them to rehabilitate themselves into civil life. These undertakings are pointed to as failures, and no reference whatever is made to conditions under which these projects were started, nor the purpose for which they were started.

**Instead of Doles**

The fact of the matter is that at the time these various works were undertaken, the costs were at the very peak, while labor was at its most inefficient period, and the Government, in undertaking these works, knew that there would be some loss, but instead of adopting the "dole" system as they did, and have been pursuing in Great Britain we felt that we should undertake works where we would at least get a run for our money and have something to show for the expenditure, and no one is passing fair judgment upon our work in this connection unless he reflects upon and takes into consideration the rea-
