EXECUTION OF KING CHARLES

London Newspaper Comments on Anniversary of His Death

GHOST CARRIES HEAD.

Saturday was the 278th anniversary of the execution of Charles I. and some good souls with a defective sense of evidence demonstrated in his honor, as usual, in front of his statue at Charing Cross says the Manchester Guardian. No doubt the passing Londoner looked on with the same good-humored English tolerance which has set up statues of Charles and of Cromwell a few hundred yards apart. Of course there have been much worse English kings than Charles I, but none of them was quite such an impossible person; he seems to have had in their perfection those secondary virtues of positiveness and shiftness, which may make men even more hopeless to deal with than they would be made by first-rate cardinal vices; he asked for trouble in such trumpet tones as only the ex-Kaiser, among modern European sovereigns, has emitted, and in both cases the call was indignantly answered.

Death Contested

Even his death, however, is contested by some undervaluers of evidence, who hug the pleasant notion that the King was not executed at all. He was, they say, a Freemason, and those who were to see that he was beheaded

were Freemasons too; so they procured a substitute—presumably a still more ardent Freemason—who undertook the passive part in the memorable scene, while the ex-King retired to Oxford and became Elias Ashmole, founder of the Ashmolean Museum in that place, just as Lord Kitchener, according to some visionaries, retired from the Hampshire and has since been living in private. Ashmole, according to the "Dictionary of National Biography," was "no ordinary man." So he must have been Charles I.

Ghost Walks

That is about the average quality of the arguments in favor of this theory. They do not seriously imperil the tradition that after the library of a certain Oxford college is closed for the night Charles I. may be heard walking up and down it with his head under his arm. Of course it is not easy to tell, by the sound of an unseen person's footsteps overhead, whether he is carrying his head under his arm or not, but an Oxford cricket "Blue" who had rooms under the library is said to have been so seriously disturbed by the tramping that he lost his form for some time—which looks as if there were something in it, or at any rate as if there were nothing in the common theory that these super-alibetic people are devoid of imagination.

The number of places in which a ghostly King Charles disturbs the sleep of later generations is, of course, very large; his ghost has multiplied himself like Falstaff's men in buckram or like the "True Cross" of mediaeval legend, which was to be found in all parts of the world, and must, according to Swift, have contained, in the aggregate, enough timber to build several large navies.

Shakespeare's Ghost

One of Shakespeare's English kings took measures for appearing in a great many places at the same time, and apparently in the same clothes, but it scarcely seems likely that an ordinary Freemason could become such a pluralist spectre. We think Charles I. must have been headed.

DRAYTON HUMOR OTTAWA HOUSE

Wants to Know Why Government Has Not Been Carrying on Business

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—One of the most humorous of Parliamentary episodes this session was the naive inquiry of Sir Henry Drayton as to why the Government was unable to carry on business. He and his associates had been obstructing public business effectively for many weeks and then he opens his speech with these words:

"I do not know that I could expect, but I think I would have been justified in expecting as well as hoping—that my hon. friend at present leading the House (Mr. Lapointe) would have given us some reasons why his government thought it necessary at this particular point to admit their total incapacity to carry on public business. I take it that my hon. friend deems that task perhaps very difficult to accomplish. Whatever apologies may be made and they must be feigned, they cannot be real—the fact is that by this motion the government say: We are not in a position to carry on public business. Although we called parliament for the purpose of carrying on public business, although we held ourselves out as a government constituted and functioning we are not; we cannot carry on public business. Then, Sir, it becomes necessary to make this motion, perhaps the last phase of a series of contentions and attempts to keep in office a government that ought not to be in office."

TOKIO FISH MARKET LARGEST IN COUNTRY

Has 750 Wholesalers and 552 Brokers and There are Two Thousand Fishmongers

TOKYO, Feb. 26.—One of the attractions of Japan, notwithstanding the cherry blossoms and the more or less beautiful geisha girl, is the Tokyo fish market. It is the largest in the country and occupies 480,000 square feet. The market is an association of 750 wholesalers and 552 brokers who operate under the supervision of municipal authorities.

Two thousand fish mongers and buyers from numerous hotels and restaurants assemble at this market every morning between 5 and 10 o'clock and carry away with them from 800 to 1,200 tons of fish.

MAY CARRY CANE WHEN VISITING JAP ROYALTY

TOKYO, Feb. 25.—Admiral Count Togo, commander of the Japanese fleet which destroyed the Russian squadrons in the Battle of the Sea of Japan in May, 1905, now enfeebled by his 80 years, has been granted special permission to carry a cane when visiting the Imperial Court.

The carrying of sticks of any sort in the presence of the nation's rulers is forbidden by court etiquette, but exception in the case of the aged sea hero was made by formal ruling of the Minister of the Imperial Household.

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
