WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Salmon fishing is improving—halibut men are doing well—activity in boat building

Encouraging news has been received this week from the Hippo Island trolling grounds to the effect that the salmon run in that district has greatly improved recently. Fishermen and fish packers have hurried over to the west coast to get in on the rush, and old timers predict this is a good sign for the commencement of the cannery season proper.

News has come from Dundas Island that the run of fish is gradually improving in that district and the fishermen are quite optimistic as to the final outcome from a revenue bearing standpoint.

That the halibut fishermen, generally speaking, are making good this season is the consensus of opinion on the waterfront. The trips are good both from a quantity and price standpoint and everyone seems pretty well satisfied. Halibut has been coming in well during the past week and prices have remained pretty firm around 15c and 16c for American, and around 14c and 15c for Canadian catches.

Halibut arrivals for the past week (Saturday to Friday inclusive) totalled 679,000 pounds. American vessels landing 342,500 pounds and Canadians, 336,500 pounds. This brings the total landings for the year to 12,026,200 pounds of which 8,700,000 pounds has been brought in by American boats and 3,326,000 pounds by Canadian.
