PRINCE RUPERT MAN IN ALASKA

F. G. Brynolson Extols Alaska Spruce and Tells of Demand in East

"For factory use, Alaska spruce is superior to the product of any other district," declares F. G. Brynolson, representative of the Northwest Spruce Co., who is now completing a periodical visit to Southeastern Alaska, says the Ketchikan Chronicle.

The truth of the statement made above is borne out, Mr. Brynolson says, by the fact that during the year of 1925 when eastern United States and United Kingdom markets were glutted with lumber and the demand and prices were low, spruce lumber from Alberta was sold with little difficulty and for better prices than were received by Oregon and Washington spruce producers and at prices in excess of those received in 1924, which was regarded as a very prosperous year in the spruce business.

In the New England states with their large pine forests, spruce lumber from Oregon, Washington and Alaska, is gaining great favor with factories and there is a real demand now for Alaskan spruce. And this demand is greater than for the Oregon and Washington spruce.

Chan Sing, owner and lessee, respectively, of the farm, brought suit against the logging company for nearly \$15,000 damages in the Supreme Court last week.

Mr. Justice Morrison gave judgment for the plaintiffs, ruling that the company was negligent in that it operated during a period of hot weather and drought, when the whole countryside was in an inflammable condition.

But his Lordship confessed himself utterly perplexed by the conflicting nature of the evidence adduced as to the exact nature of the damage done to the property and to the crops grown upon it by Chan Sing. Pointing out that reputable witnesses for both sides gave diametrically opposing testimony of this phase of the action, Mr. Justice Morrison suggested a mediator and as a result Mr. Palmer, who is an expert horticulturalist and agriculturalist, was appointed.

IRISH PARTY REACH CANADA

Brogue of Ulster and Armagh Heard in Winnipeg Union Station

WINNIPEG, April 8. — The brogue of the north of Ireland resounded in the Union station here last night, when the first Irish party of considerable size of the season arrived on the third Canadian National immigration special so far this week from the S.S. Almania. Several prosperous families from Ulster, Armagh and other northern counties were included in the large group of young single men from the same district making 141 persons in all. Among them was John J. Campbell, who worked some years at farm work in Manitoba about a decade ago, and has now arrived with his wife and three children to make his home somewhere in the west.

These families, together with those included in the party of 122 English are being settled under the 3,000 family scheme. The balance of the train was made up of 72 Ukrainians, 41 Norwegians, eight of other nationalities, all of whom were booked by C.N.R. colonization officials immediately on arrival to points in the west where farm work was awaiting them.

The first party booked by the British settlement society, nine Irish, were on this train and are being placed by the society's Winnipeg representative.

HIS DEATH IS MYSTERY

Vancouver Police Seeking to Unravel Circumstances of Lulu Island Rancher's Demise

VANCOUVER, April 8. — The police are seeking a young girl in the hope of clearing up the mystery surrounding the death of John Metcalf, middle aged Lulu Island resident, who was found dead on Wednesday afternoon in a Granville Street rooming house. The man engaged the room on Tuesday and was accompanied by a girl who he said was to have been a nurse for the family which was coming later. Metcalf was last seen alive at 10 o'clock Tuesday night, the girl having left several hours earlier. The cause of the death is unknown.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 18, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, cowboys and travellers, up to 10 head.
