ST. LOUIS WINS WORLD SERIES BASEBALL

FARMERS OF THE BULKLEY AND NECHACO VALLEYS TO JOIN WHEAT POOL

World Series Baseball Won by St. Louis After Close Contest with N.Y.

NEW YORK, October 11.—The gaunt weatherbeaten figure of Grover Cleveland Alexander came back in all its ancient pitching mastery yesterday to check the Yankees for the third time and clinch the first World Baseball Series championship for St. Louis in forty years. In the seventh and deciding game of diamond classic the Yankee defense cracked to yield the Cardinals a winning run of three to two, but it was Alexander who saved the day with a dramatic and exciting finish. The bases were full with two out only, with the Yankees leading a run to tie the game in the seventh, when Alexander came to the aid of the tottering Cardinal's right hander Haines, whose finger had split from throwing a knuckle ball and whose control was ebbing fast. Facing Lazzeri, the great Veteran called power to his right arm that carried him through sixteen major league campaigns and struck out his man who retired as the crowd broke into a frenzied uproar. Safely past this crisis, Alexander easily subdued the Yankees in the closing two innings.

BARFACED AND DIABOLICAL

DATE OF JAMES FANSLER TURNED OVER TO HEIRS OF FOURTH WIDOW

BATTLE, Oct. 11.—Ruling that James Fansler's estate was obtained by fraud in the fourth woman he married, Superior Judge Paul awarded it to her. It had been contested by three previous widows.

The judge made the decision, involving \$260,000 before the attorneys had made their closing arguments. He decried Fansler's career as "barfaced and diabolical in its cleverness and unbelieved in the history of the courts in fiction."

POWER BOAT IS LAUNCHED HERE

The new power boat for the forestry department, which has been under construction at the dry dock here, was launched on Saturday in the presence of V. Caverhill, chief forester for the province. The vessel which is forty feet long, has a 16 h.p. Vivian engine and trial runs will take place in a few days. J. H. Blake, superintendent engineer for the department, having arrived here yesterday to supervise finishing touches on the boat.

FOUND BODY BESIDE HORSE

MERRITT, Oct. 11.—Police are investigating the finding of the body of Ed. McEvoy, a Nicola Valley trapper, who had been missing since August 17. The body was found in a large hole a few feet from his cabin with his dead horse beside him. Both had been shot. It is not known if the deaths were accidental or not.

PILOT COMES TO LOCATE HERE IN BUSINESS OF PORT

Capt. Larry Thomson of the Federal Pilots Ltd., arrived from Victoria on the Cardena yesterday afternoon to take up his permanent station here in the business of piloting ocean going boats to and from the port.

Capt. Thomson is a pioneer navigator of the northern coast having been for many years with the Union Steamship Co. and also with the Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co. He is registered at the Central Hotel.

Capt. Thomson, who will have his headquarters in the office of the Northern Shipping Co., Hays Block, will bring the Aden Maru, the first grain ship, into Prince Rupert Harbor.

BIG REPAIR JOB COMING

CANADIAN IMPORTER WILL ARRIVE AT LOCAL DRY DOCK TOMORROW

To undergo an extensive damage repair job, C.G.M.M. freighter Canadian Importer will arrive here early tomorrow morning to go on dry dock. This is the large job that has referred to by B.C. Keeley, Pacific Coast manager C.G.M.M. on a recent visit here. The work will take a month or more and will keep in employment the large crew of men which has been here for the last couple of months on the Canadian Coaster job.

This will be the first visit to this port of the Canadian Importer. She has been in the C.G.M.M. intercoastal service and arrived on the coast recently from Montreal. The vessel was built in Vancouver in 1919. One of the larger type of the company vessels, her gross tonnage is 5465 and length 400 feet with beam of 52.4 and depth 28.8. She has had a varied and at times a hectic career having once been in a smash-up on this coast.

The present work is made necessary through the importer having gone ashore in the St. Lawrence River near Montreal several months ago.

B.C. SILVER ENDS WORK FOR SEASON ON HUDSON BAY MOUNTAIN

Douglas Ray, who has been in charge of the development work at the Schuler properties on Hudson Bay Mountain, passed through here yesterday going north to Anxox last night on the Cardena. He says that the B.C. Silver Corporation has shut down work for this season and he is not sure whether it will be resumed or not. He did not care to say anything in regard to the results obtained or whether his company was likely to take up the option it holds.

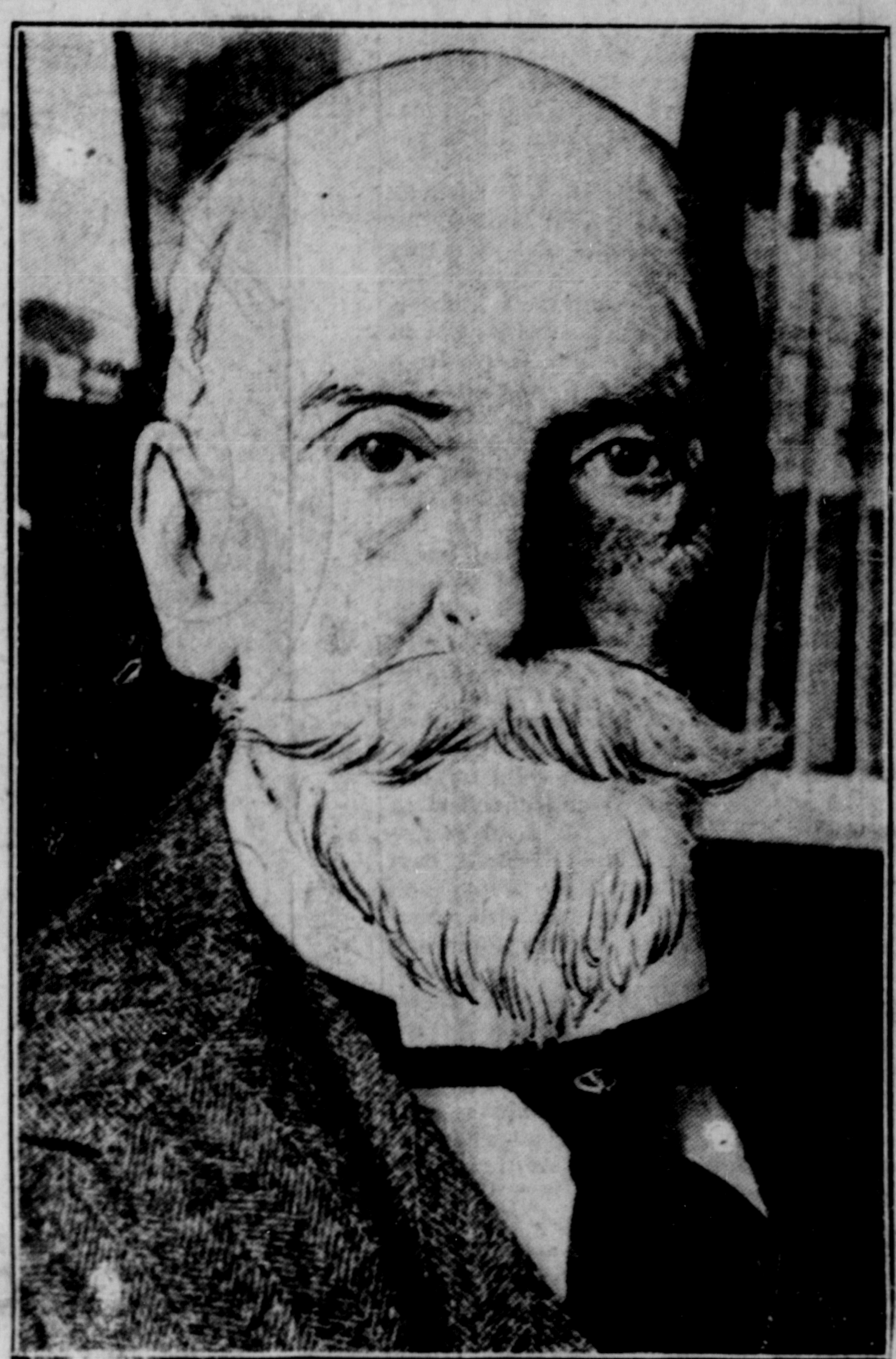

Disastrous Blaze in Douglas and Treadwell on Sunday Has Destroyed 225 People's Homes

JUNEAU, October 11.—Seventy-five whites and 150 Indians are homeless following a fire which yesterday swept the towns of Douglas and Treadwell a little less than two miles from here across Gastineau Channel. The residences of twenty-four white people and forty-two Indians were destroyed.

The conflagration started in the Indian village near Douglas and wiped it out. The flames jumped into the town of Douglas where thirteen residences, two business blocks, the Catholic and Congregational Churches and the old hospital building were destroyed and then to Treadwell, destroying a store and office building there and eleven residences including the household belongings. Every family being made homeless by the fire loss. The Juneau chapter of the American Red Cross has started efforts to provide housing facilities for the homeless.

TRAPPED IN MINE IN SOUTH AFRICA

CAPETOWN, Oct. 11.—Four whites and 116 natives were entombed in a coal mine following an explosion Friday. The rescuers succeeded in bringing the bodies of eleven men to the surface but there is little hope of reaching those remaining. Smoke and flames coming from the shaft are visible for two miles.

Wu Chang Falls to Southern Red Army of China in Civil Conflict Now Raging in Country

HANKOW, October 11.—That tragic episode, the siege of Wu Chang, is over and the Red Cantonese army occupied the city yesterday and found the woebegone populace suffering from lack of food. Numerous deaths had taken place in the city, many of which were attributed to starvation but were said to be due to other causes, principally to the violence suffered by women and children in the mad rush to reach the rescue boats sent by the Red Cross to take the civilians to Hankow.

It is reported that the northern commanders, who have been holding the city, were made prisoners after the soldiers threw open the gates admitting the southern troops.

Farmers of Interior to Join Wheat Pool is Reported to Victoria

VICTORIA, October 11.—British Columbia agriculture will be linked with the powerful prairie wheat pool as a result of successful production of hard wheat in large quantities in northern British Columbia for shipment to the world markets. The farmers of Bulkley and Nechaco will join the pool permitting the shipment of their grain via Prince Rupert elevator which the pool controls, the department of agriculture is advised.

CEMETERY QUESTION AT VANCOUVER GETS ITS FINAL QUIETUS

VICTORIA, Oct. 11.—The Provincial Board of Health passed an order refusing the use of Valhalla Valley cemetery site for burial purposes, Hon. T. D. Pattullo announced Saturday. In view of the order of the Board of Health, he said, it is not possible to use the site for cemetery purposes and as a consequence the department of lands is advising the purchaser that the department will consider an application for cancellation of the agreement of sale for refund of monies on account of the purchase of the land.

NEW COMPANY FORMED HERE

PHILIP M. RAY PLANS TO DO GENERAL SHIPPING BUSINESS AT THIS PORT

Philip M. Ray, who has severed his connection with the B. L. Johnson-Walton Co., Ltd. and the Hecate Stralis Towing Co., Ltd. on the amalgamation of the latter company with the Pacific (Coyle) Navigation Co., Ltd. and has organized a new company—the Northern Shipping Co., Ltd. This company will open up offices in the Hays Block, corner 2nd St. and 2nd Ave. about October 15, and will act as agents for the B. L. Johnson, Walton Co., Ltd. and all lines represented by them, also other shipping companies in Vancouver, besides being local representative for the Pacific (Coyle) Navigation Co., Ltd. A general shipping and marine insurance agents business will be transacted by the new company.

J. P. Hardie, who has been engaged in the shipping business in Glasgow, will join the company at an early date.

COL. SWEENEY IS DEAD IN MONTREAL

Was Commandant of Indian Army Service Corps Training Establishment in India

MONTREAL, Oct. 11.—Lieut. Col. Roger Campbell Sweeney, aged 48, commandant of the Indian Army Service Corps training establishment in India, is dead here. Deceased, who was educated in Canada, has a brother, Bishop Sweeney, in Toronto.

FERRYMAN SAW MRS. McPHERSON

MISSING LINK SAID TO HAVE BEEN FOUND BY INVESTIGATORS IN CONSPIRACY CASE

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 11.—Arthur Watts, ferryman at the Blythe Ehrenberg crossing of the Colorado River has identified Mrs. Almee Semple McPherson as the woman who crossed over into Arizona at that point during the early part of last June it was announced at the district attorney's office on Sunday. Watts will be summoned as a witness at the McPherson conspiracy hearing this week. Watts is quoted as saying that he, not only saw Mrs. McPherson, but that he spoke to her as he ferried her across the river in his boat. This identification is said to furnish the missing link in the chain of evidence pursued by investigators in their endeavor to learn the lady pastor's whereabouts between May 29 and June 23 last.

LABOR REFUSES AFFILIATION

BIG VOTE AGAINST JOINING WITH COMMUNISTS TAKEN AT ANNUAL CONFERENCE

MARGATE, Oct. 11.—At the opening of the 26th annual conference of the labor party today an attempt to reopen the question of affiliation between the communist and labor party was decisively dealt with. The vote against reopening was 2,700,000 to 350,000.

MANY FANS AT WORLD SERIES

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—St. Louis and New York fans numbering 328,000 paid \$1,200,000 to witness the seventh world series contests. Yesterday at New York, the weather was not good yet 38,000 watched the game.

CANADA TO HAVE NO GRIEVANCE STATES KING ON LEAVING

QUEBEC, Oct. 11.—Canada will take no grievance to the Imperial Conference Premier King stated Saturday night as he sailed for England to attend the party. He said that Canada would be represented at the conference as a full self governing nation within the British Commonwealth.

MILLION DOLLAR FIRE SAN FRANCISCO MILLS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—Four lumber mills on Brannan Street were destroyed by fire last night with an estimated loss of a million dollars. Within a few minutes after the discovery of the fire the entire block occupied by the mills was a mass of flames.

DROWNED FROM LAUNCH.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 11.—Martin O'Brien, deck hand on the Canadian Fishing Company's launch B.B. was drowned at Deep Water Bay, according to word received at his home here.
