THANKSGIVING AT LAWN HILL ON LAST SATURDAY EVENING

People Travelled For Many Miles in Order to Attend Services at Institute Hall

SKIDEGATE, Nov. 5.—Harvest thanksgiving services were held at Lawn Hill by Rev. J. Gillett of Massett last Saturday evening at the Farmers' Institute Hall. People from both north and south came from long distances, some of them travelling almost all day in cars or motorboats. All the white settlers at Skidegate and Tiel were there.

The building was well decorated for the occasion. E. S. Richardson, N. Schafer, R. G. Emmerson and A. Beebe put their motor cars at the disposal of the public so that all might be there.

After the service Mr. Gillett put on his moving pictures and this was the first time some of the children had ever seen movies.

At the close a hearty vote of thanks was passed to Mr. Gillett and the hope expressed that he would find it possible to come oftener.

MISSIONARIES CALLED FOOLS IN AFRICA

WINNIPEG, Nov. 5.—Natives of West Africa designate missionaries as "fools" it was related here in an address by Rev. A. Tucker, who for many years has served in that particular field.

The missionaries, he explained, were so dubbed, not from malice but rather because to the native, the expression was one of praise.

When the first missionaries ventured into West Africa, the natives had inquired from a Dutchman who spoke their language: "Who are these men who carry no whiskey for trade?" The Dutchman replied: "They are fools who come here to convert you." Since then the name had stuck, but with a different meaning to that conveyed to the average person.

BUILT BRIDGES ON QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS THIS YEAR
