Bermuda Suffers Great Loss as Result of Big Hurricane at Week-end

H.M S. Valerian and British freighter Eastway lost with many on board---Curlew hyures in rescue

HAMILTON, Bermuda, October 25 .- The loss of the sloop H.M.S. Valerian and the British freighter Eastway with a total of about one hundred lives, damage to many buildings and an unprecendented loss in the harbor and local shipping constitute the toll of the West Indian hurricane which swept over Bermude on Friday.

Nineteen men are the sole survivors of the Valerian crew of which 84 officers and men perished. Capt. Osher and one other officer of the vessel were saved. One seaman said that the Valerian turned turtle and the life rafts were the only means of safety. The survivors were picked up by H.M.S. Capetown after being adrift for 24 hours.
