

TOPLEY STRIKE IMPORTANT ONE

Douglas Lay, Resident Mining Engineer, Reports on Recent Interior Find

That the new strike of ore near Topley Station in the Bulkley Valley, announced exclusively in the Daily News several weeks ago, is one of the greatest mineral discoveries made in the history of the province, is a conviction growing among mining men.

If ore exposed on the surface for a length of 300 feet and with a breadth of 150 feet persists to a depth of 300 feet, as is deemed more than possible, and if surface values persist, the block so indicated would contain between \$10,000,000 and \$20,000,000 in ore.

This calculation was made at the British Columbia Chamber of Mines.

Has Great Depth

Douglas Lay, resident provincial engineer, has examined the property which is on Black Mountain, 8 1/2 miles from the Canadian National line, has given a description of the property. His report is commented upon in the Engineering & Mining Journal of New York as follows:

"The deposit occurs near the junction of the rhyolitic tuff and andesite. The mineralized zone is 150 feet wide, and may be more as mineralization penetrates into the andesite. It is exposed for 300 feet along a creek and has been traced for another 300 feet where it disappears beneath drift.

Assays \$20 Ton

"Precious metals occur in lenses and stringers composed chiefly of galena and arsenopyrite, the silver probably being associated with the former and the gold with the latter.


"Samples taken indicate the full width will assay \$20 a ton in gold and silver, the value of the silver content usually being slightly higher than that of the gold. On the surface the mineralized zone is so soft that it may be possible to mine with a steam shovel."
