"I was in a convoy of about 300 persons ordered to accompany and protect Mussolini on His flight to Switzerland.

"About 5 a.m. we had to stop in the village of Musso because partisans had blocked the way. It was a foggy morning, with tirizzling rain. Mussolini and his mistress, Claretta Petacci, were in an armored scout car at the head of the convoy. Behind them came a truck with 20 S.S. men and then eight or nine civilian cars with members of Mussolini's cabinet and senior Fascist party officials with at the end of the convoy.
