#### CONDITION OF CHINA IS MENACE TO THE WORLD.

The condition of China today is a menace to the world. There is no stable government in that country and there seems to be no hope for the future. While the Chinese object to foreigners interfering, they also object to any government taking charge. The result is disastrous. There is probably no country in the world today where there is more graft, piracy, and robbery by violence than in China, a country that is not a military country and that does not believe in military systems.

The country is so large, the communication so poor and the people so ignorant, generally, that the task of bringing about a better condition seems hopeless unless a strong dictator should arise who would first bring order out of chaos and then set about edu cating the people in regard to democratic government.
