GIRL WON PRIZE MOWING CONTEST

Beat Dozen Men by Doing More and Better Work Than Any With Scythe

DURHAM, N.H., Sept. 10.—New Hampshire discovered a Gertrude Ederle of the scythe when at a recent hand-mowing contest the 19-year-old Helen Bernaby won the prize and easily proved herself a better mower than the twelve other contestants. Miss Bernaby, the only woman in the contest, cut a swath 288 1/2 feet long and 10 1/2 rows wide in the five minutes' time, easily a longer row than that mowed by any of the 12 men, some of whom had swung a scythe in more than two score harvests. She learned the art by herself on her father's farm, she explained, having watched the men at work and beginning to try her hand at it when she was about 10 years old. She had put in no special training for the event. She arose at 4.30 a.m., did the morning chores, came to Durham to the mowing contest and won it. That was all. The prize was \$15.00.

TORONTO RACES ARE NEXT WEEK

Ontario Jockey Club Meeting Has Many Interesting Events

TORONTO, Sept. 10.—Packed with rich and long-established feature races is the program for the autumn meeting of the Ontario Jockey Club at Woodbine Park, Toronto, from Sept. 15 to 22 next. The Toronto Autumn Cup, \$10,000 added; Hendrie Steeplechase, \$7,500 added; and the Grey Stakes for two-year-olds, will provide exceptionally fine fields to attract thoroughbred lovers from all parts of the eastern half of the continent.

For Juvenile Champion

The Grey Stakes is one of the most attractive races on the card. The field will comprise the best juveniles of the Eastern Turf, among them, perhaps, the winner of the 1925 King's Plate. The race is a mile, with \$5,000 added. The victor will generally be acclaimed the juvenile champion of 1926. Commander J. K. L. Ross, who has won the race the last five years, has only one entry this fall—Lactamus, a brown colt by Gudget-Milkmaid. Mrs. Livingstone will start Ever More, who has performed well this season. The Seagram Stable's colt Sir Henry and filly Uppetta; and the Tetratema colt Tetra Glass, are likely to be contenders. Other notable among the 57 nominated are O. F. Burkhardt's Heart Ache and J. P. White's speedy Listerine.

A high class field is assured in the Toronto Autumn Cup, topped by Princess Doreen, "queen of the American turf," who is entered by the Audley Farm stable. The race is a mile and a quarter. Single Foot and Canner, from J. L. Griffith; Display, Breakneck winner; Harrovian, Sewickley Stable; and R. L. Serry's peanuts are among the 33 entrants. E. F. Whitney's Joy Smoke, with a fine record this season, and Commander Ross' Wheatstick are also entered.

Sleepchases

The 29 entrants in the Hendrie Steeplechase, which will feature the last day of the meeting, include three former winners—Thorndale, 1925; Dunk's Green, 1924; and Minata, 1922. Herrard, Jolly Roger and Rip are other good "leapers" among the entry list, which shows much quality. The race is three miles.

The Woodbine Autumn Steeplechase, \$5,000 added, two miles, is on the opening day card along with the Toronto Autumn Cup. The Maple Leaf Stakes, \$3,000 added, a mile and a sixteenth, is one of the features on September 16. This race is for three and four year old fillies foaled in Canada, and includes such well known racers as Jean Crest from the Cedar Crest stable; Brookdale stable's Heretrix, and J. C. Fletcher's Fairbank. The favorite will likely be Commander Ross' great filly Tatting.

Seagram Handicap

Other outstanding races to be run during the meeting are the Seagram handicap, \$3,000 added; Stanley Produce Stakes, \$1,000 added, which has attracted a remarkably fine field of three-year-olds; the Ontario Jockey Club Cup, and the Burham Cup Handicap.

FAMOUS BATTLES FOR THE HEAVYWEIGHT TITLE

Jim Jefferies Won

Jim Jefferies stopped Jim Corbett at Coney Island, May 11, 1900, the end coming in the twenty-third round. The former champion was much impressed by the force of the punch felling him. "I have no recollection of the blow," he was quoted as saying, "but it must have been a corker."

Jefferies took cognizance of the fact that he had been referred to as a horse. "They say that I am a car-horse and all that sort of thing but none of them beat me," was his answer to this criticism. The champion also complained that "Corbett sprinted a lot," admitting that he (Jefferies) could hit better than he could run. Corbett came out of the affair with a good deal of credit. His showing drew a tribute from Referee George White. "He never fought better" was the arbiter's word of praise.
