

TERMINALS WON FOOTBALL GAME

Had Close Contest Last Night With Cold Storage at Aeropolls Hill Grounds

Quite a large crowd of soccer fans turned up at the Aeropolls Hill grounds last night to witness the football game between the Grand Terminals and the Cold Storage and, even though they were not treated to any great extent to the finer points of the game they at least saw a keen hard struggle in which the Terminals were successful in winning by a score of three goals to two.

The teams took the field as follows:

Grand Terminals—R. Howe; G. Howe and H. Menzies; Dickens, O'Donnell and V. Menzies; Walters, Owen, Wiper, Mitchell and Farquhar.

Cold Storage—Murray; Haig, Harris; Macdonald, Wood and Doherty; Johnson, Lambe, Erskine, Baker and Norrington.

Referee—G. Krause.

Linemen—H. Worsfold and L. V. Lane.

The Storage won the toss and took advantage of the grade but the earlier exchanges were in favor of the Terminals and it was not long ere Wiper, profiting by some loose defensive work, beat Murray. After a spell of midfield play in which team work was lacking on both sides, the Storage broke away and Erskine made the scores level with a shot that gave Howe no chance.

Farquhar was mainly responsible in regaining the lead for the Terminals when he got across one of his few real centres, and Owen, meeting the ball with his head, made no mistake in registering point number two. Shortly afterwards the Storage were awarded a penalty but Macdonald made little use of the spot kick, the ball hitting the upright and ultimately going past. Lambe also failed to accept a good scoring chance shortly afterwards and the teams retired at half time with the score standing two to one in favor of the Terminal.

Second Half

Even play featured the opening of the second half with the Terminals always a little more dangerous. Owen was sadly at fault twice in the early stages of this half when he was presented with good scoring chances, missing the ball completely on one occasion. The Storage were awarded another penalty and this time Lambe was entrusted with the kick, but fared no better than his team mate, shooting the ball straight to Howe who had to make little effort to clear.

At the other end the Terminals forced a corner and Walters' kick from the flag was helped into the net by Murray to make the game almost safe. Erskine had a good try at the other end hitting the underside of the crossbar with Howe well beaten, only to see the ball rebound into play. Shortly afterwards the Storage fared better, Harris driving in a hard shot which H. Menzies stopped with his hands in goal and the referee awarded the Storage the point.

Ordered From Field

Considerable argument followed this decision and H. Menzies was finally ordered from the field. The final whistle sounded soon afterwards with the Terminals retiring deservedly winners by three goals to two, although had they accepted their chances the Storage might easily have saved a point.

It is to be regretted that incidents such as happened last night should occur in any game, and it is to be hoped that the executive will deal with the case effectively. The game must be kept clean and above reproach if the continued support of the sport-loving public is to be secured.
