Tentative arrangements have been made for the winners of the Alberta section of the Connaught Cup soccer series to meet the British Columbia victors in Vancouver on July 17. There will be two games between the provincial winners with total goals deciding which will advance. The Connaught Cup is the emblem of soccer supremacy in Canada and separate competitions are played in each province before the final play-off. The series in this province has reached the penultimate stage and the first of the semi-finals is being played this afternoon in Vancouver between Westminster United and Sapperton. Canadian Collieries and Nanaimo will meet in the other semi-final.

So many requests have been made for games to be played other than those scheduled that Arthur Kingscott, manager of the British Football Association touring party that played in Vancouver this week and won 5 to 1, acting in conjunction with the Dominion Football Association has decided to play two extra games at the completion of the regular program.
