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# YOUNG WOMAN VICTIM FIENDISH MURDER

## BODY OF M. B. FAVOR DISCOVERED AT SAN JOSEF BAY BY SEARCH PARTY

### Twenty-two Year Old College Girl Beaten to Death with Stone

Dishwasher arrested for atrocity at Seattle which resembles Loretta Chisholm killing at Port Essington

SEATTLE, June 19.—Edward Dietrich, a dishwasher, was arrested at Everett early today in connection with the fiendish murder of Miss Sylvia H. Gaines, 22-year-old college graduate, who had just returned here from Massachusetts to reside with her father and who was the victim of a vicious attack on shore of Green Lake on Wednesday night. The body was found Thursday on the shore of the lake where the girl had been picked up and later beaten to death with a stone. Detectives found finger prints on the stone and they expected to be able to trace down the perpetrator of the crime.

Miss Gaines left for a stroll Wednesday evening and was seen by a couple during her walk along the shore according to police reports. Two young University of Washington students, strolling along the lake, are reported to have noticed an automobile near where the body was found. Miss Odessa Gill stated that, with her companion, she noticed a boy of slender build carrying a heavy object. Hearing a groaning sound, Miss Gill's companion called out: "What's the matter?" and the young man answered: "Oh, just a drunken guy." The groaning sound continued and then the girl states she saw the man raise a stone several times while the groaning was repeated. Thinking it was just a case of a drunken man, the couple walked away.

Detectives declare that Dietrich answers closely to the description given by Miss Gill.

Mrs. Bertha Landes, mayor of Seattle, today asked the municipal council to offer a suitable reward for the apprehension of the slayer.

### CANADIANS ARE GIVEN GREETING

Special Arrangements Made For Delegations to Eucharistic Congress

CHICAGO, June 19.—When the first of the official representation of Canadian ecclesiastics to the Eucharistic Congress reached Chicago on the International Limited of the Canadian National Railways, these dignitaries were accorded a special welcome. To provide for this, His Excellency Mgr. Pietro Di Maria, the Papal Delegate to Canada, and those who accompanied him, were invited to leave the train at 47th Street so that they might be greeted in proper manner and without obtruding on the ceremonies arranged for Cardinal Bonzano, the accredited papal delegate to the Congress. A group of Congress officials and a number of those interested in the French language section were present, the latter being particularly desirous of welcoming His Grace, Mgr. Georges Gauthier, apostolic administrator of Montreal, who has been chosen to act as chairman of this important group. With Archbishop Gauthier was His Lordship Mgr. A. E. Deschamps, co-adjutor bishop of Montreal.

At Congress headquarters much comment was made upon the very large delegation coming from Canada. The special trains from Montreal over the Canadian National Railways have been timed in such a manner as to allow the Pilgrims to at once repair to the church of Notre Dame where the Canadians will have the special privilege of assisting at midnight mass, which will be solemnized only at this edifice. Western Canadians travelling in a special Canadian National train due in Chicago Sunday forenoon will be given an opportunity to celebrate mass early Sunday when the train is stopped for one hour for this purpose before reaching the city.

### KENNEDY MAY RESIGN SEAT

Says That is His Intention as Soon as Legally Possible Insulted by Meighen

OTTAWA, June 19.—D. M. Kennedy, Progressive member for Peace River, making a statement on a question of privilege in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon, announced his intention of resigning his seat when he could legally do so.

Referring to the statement of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, during the recent debate on the Peace River election case, that "after he has done his fair share to keep this government in power the member for Peace River will get some nominal job in order that his seat may be made vacant," Mr. Kennedy denied absolutely the truth of any rumor on which such a statement could be made and added that he considered it an insult.

### Remains of Seattle Aviator Found Near Wrecked Plane; No Trace Yet of Swineheart

SEATTLE, June 19.—A telegram received last night from the search party sent to hunt for M. B. Favor and W. R. Swineheart, the aviators who have been missing since they left Seattle on May 16 to fly to Ketchikan, said that Favor's body had been found at San Josef Bay on the northwest coast of Vancouver Island, and that Swineheart's body had not yet been located.

Favor's body was discovered in the water near where the

British Columbia provincial police found the wrecked airplane.

A 50-foot rope was attached to the body.

### Seed Growing is Solving the Problem Over Production of Hay on Bulkley Valley Farms

SMITHERS, June 19.—An important step in the development of the Bulkley Valley and Lakes District of Central British Columbia is taking place this year. Hitherto the farmers have sold hay to loggers and others but the demand for hay has dropped off and last year's crop is still very largely in the barns of the farmers. This year the timothy will be allowed to go to seed and the seed will be marketed and will bring the farmers good returns. Next year it is hoped that turnip seed will be added to the output and possibly other seeds will be added from time to time including registered seed grain.

Canada imports from ten to fifteen million pounds of timothy seed annually. The demand is great and the price has in the past been fairly stable. It is easily shipped and no place in the world grows it better than the Bulkley and Lakes districts. It was proved last year when two car loads were shipped from the district. This year it is impossible to say what will be the output but it will be many times that of last year. Seed grown in this district is 100 per cent pure and is in great demand for that reason.

#### Government Co-operated

The new industry was made possible through the co-operation of the provincial department of agriculture, represented in the district by D. D. Munro, district representative of the land settlement board and of the department of agriculture and by D. W. Thompson, government field inspector. Last year representations were made to the government by Mr. Munro and as a result two timothy seed cleaning plants were placed in the district and operated by the government. This year these plants will be very busy and the farmers will benefit accordingly. Hon. E. D. Barlow, minister of agriculture, and Hon. A. Manson, Attor. Gen., have taken a keen interest in the work and naturally are much pleased at the developments in that line that are taking place. It is hoped to make seed production one of the features of Central British Columbia farming.

The timothy crops this year promise to be very heavy and as the sale of timothy hay is necessarily restricted the marketing of the seed is likely to prove the salvation of the districts concerned.

#### Turnip Seed

This year the government representatives are turning their attention to the growing of turnip seed. The government is providing the seed and so far seventeen growers have agreed to plant plots of commercial size with the seed. The stock roots will be produced this season and next year the seed will be harvested. If it is proved to be a commercial success the size of the plots will be increased and turnip seed growing will become one of the staple industries. The advantage of growing seed in Central B.C. is that so far north the vitality is very strong, the germinating percentage being much higher than in districts farther south. Also the land is new and clean and the seed can be guaranteed 100 per cent pure.

This year there is a large increase in the amount of grain and seed being grown in the districts. The total output for 1925 was wheat 8,830 bushels, oats 61,375 bushels, barley 7,568 bushels, and timothy 45 tons. In fact this is the first year that wheat has not been shipped into the district to feed the poultry. When this crop comes off it is planned to have wheat for the elevator at Prince Rupert and timber (continued on page six)

### QUEBEC VILLAGE PREY TO FLAMES

Edouard Oudry Loses Life and \$150,000 Damage Done When Fire Sweeps Matapedia

QUEBEC, June 19.—Edouard Oudry is dead and damage estimated at \$150,000 was done when fire practically wiped out the business section of the village of Matapedia, 400 miles from here on the New Brunswick border. The Catholic Church, two Protestant churches, three general stores, a hotel and twenty other buildings fell prey to the flames. Oudry, who was 85 years of age, lost his life when he ventured through the flames to save some effects.

### HOT CONTEST IN ALBERTA

185 Candidates are Nominated for Sixty Seats in Election On June 28

EDMONTON, June 19.—One hundred and eighty-five candidates were yesterday nominated for sixty seats which will be contested on June 28 at the general provincial election. The number of entries and the extent to which the competition is being carried on in practically every constituency stands as a new provincial record.

### HIT ICEBERG BUT IS SAFE

British Freighter Leicester Makes Newfoundland In Damaged Condition

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 19.—The British freighter Leicester came safely into port Friday night under her own steam with her bow down to the hawser pipes and her stern high up in the air, port rail level with the water and her forecastle flooded to the top of the hatch covers. The vessel had struck an iceberg on Thursday 150 miles off the coast.

### ALBERTA MOTORISTS WENT OVER BANK AS CAR BRAKES FAILED

NELSON, June 19.—Failure of brakes while going down Taghum Hill near here, sent a party of Alberta motor tourists over the bank, while starting for Fort Fraser. F. W. Hill of Hanna is in the hospital, his wife was rendered unconscious, Lucy Thompson was injured while a baby landed in a puddle alone and escaped injury.
