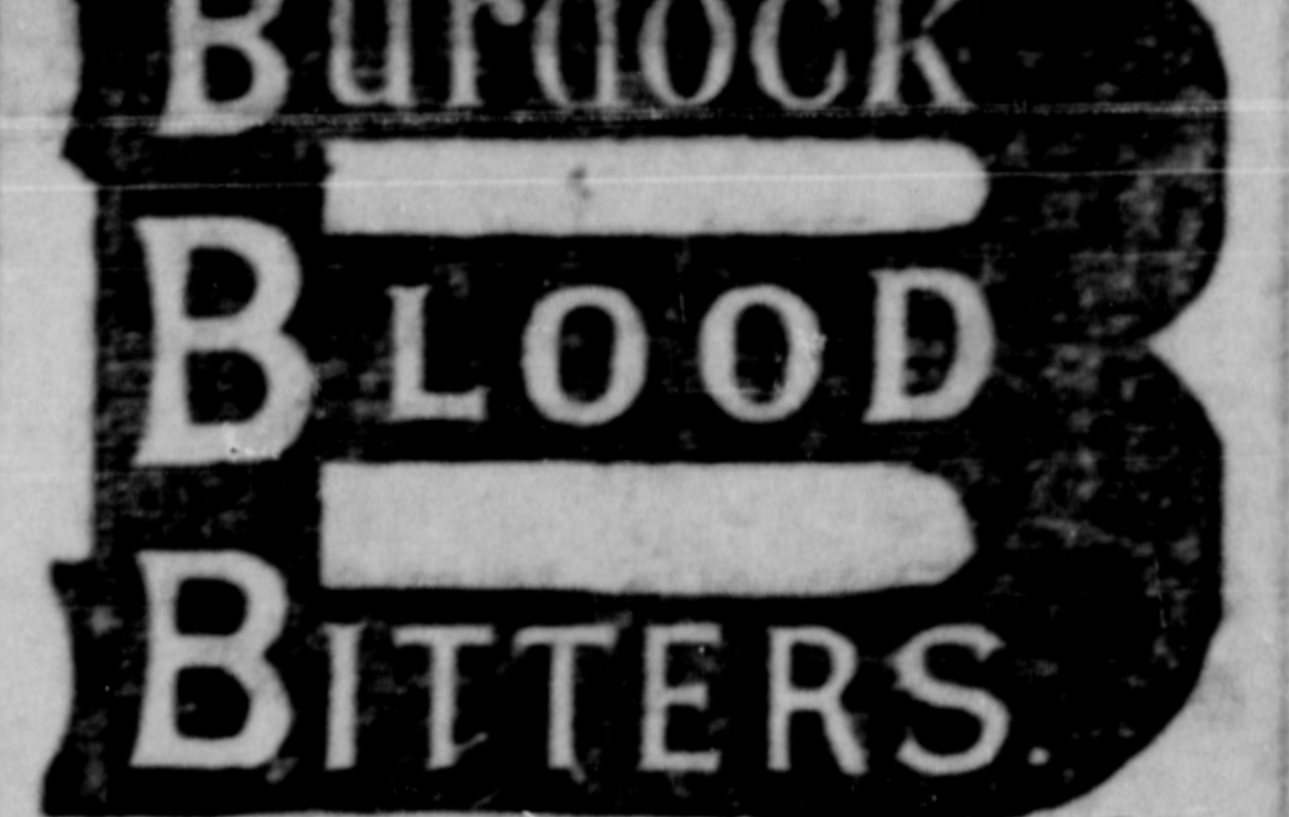
SPORT CHAT

HUSBAND SUIT AGAINST WIFE

Asks Damages for Being Tipped into Ditch from Skidding Auto

EDMONTON, July 8.—Determined to stop this vicious practice of wives occasionally tipping their husbands into the ditch while in control of the family car, an unusual action was heard before Mr. Justice Walsh in the supreme court recently, when Jas. Benjamin Smith brought action against his wife Minnie, charging that she had caused him considerable damage as a result of a motor car mishap last summer. He asked for \$2,500 general, and \$225 special damages, attesting that while making a trip from the city to Calgary in July last, with his wife at the wheel of the car, going 30 miles an hour the auto suddenly skidded on a patch of greasy road-bed and was ditched. His clothes were burned by acids and he received personal injuries. Judgment in the case was reserved.

SCIENCE PRACTITIONER RANKING AS DOCTOR

Question of Admitting Medical Certificate Discussed by Toronto School Board

TORONTO, July 8.—"What is a doctor?" This was the conundrum which under pressure from Arthur W. Roebuck, appearing on behalf of the Christian Scientists, and Trustee Edmunds, who constituted himself his supporter, puzzled the minds of the Finance Committee of the Board of Education recently. The case in question involved the payment of some \$20 to a teacher at Parkdale, Collegiate for salary deducted owing to the fact that she had submitted a medical certificate of sickness signed only by a Christian Science practitioner. Mr. Roebuck admitted however, that in one sense the matter constituted a test case since the application was not being made in reality by the teacher herself but by the Christian Science Church. The committee had before them the opinion of the Board's solicitor that the certificate of a Christian Science practitioner as distinguished from a physician or dentist did not meet the requirements either under the act or according to the bylaws of the Board. "The victory of a woman over the Channel is possible, but is it probable? I will not say it is."

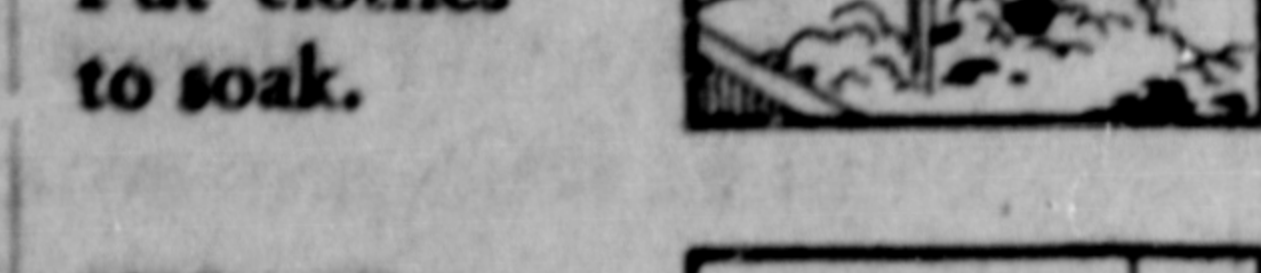

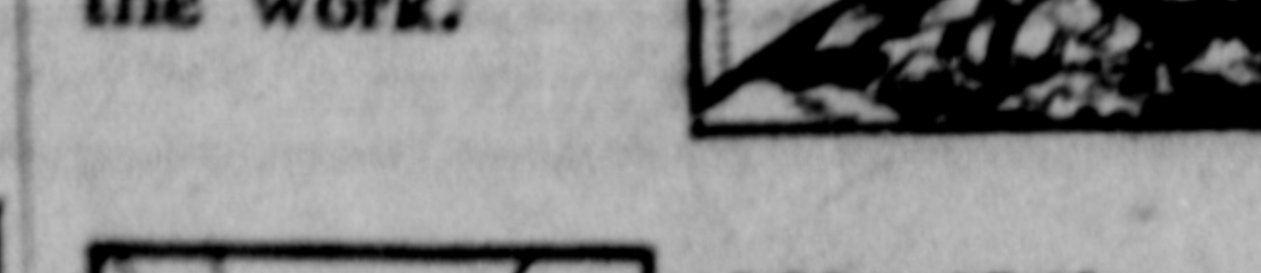
