ALBERTA WHITE FISH PRICE MOUNTS UP IN MARKET AT CHICAGO

EDMONTON, Aug. 17.—Chicago fish dealers are finding Alberta whitefish so popular that they are buying great quantities of this kind of fish, boosting local prices to 17 1/2 cents a pound, an increase of five cents in one week.

"Whitefish prices in Edmonton will never be as low as they were," stated one local fish dealer Saturday morning. Chicago dealers are buying all they can get their hands on, and so the prices went up. We have to buy at higher prices or the Chicago people will outbid us and get the fish."

For years Alberta has been trying to tell the Eastern States of the wonderful eating qualities of this fish in an endeavor to make a market for it. So sudden did the dealers in the East realize that the fish would sell well, that the prices went sky-rocketing.

DISMISSAL OF ALL RETURNING OFFICERS WAS PARTIZAN ACT

Why did Mr. Meighen dismiss nearly all of the old returning officers and appoint new ones? Those Canadians who were looking forward to seeing the political issues of their country conducted on a decent plane will probably want an answer to this as well as many other questions before September 14.

It will be remembered that a year ago the Parliament of Canada revised the Elections Act in a way calculated to obtain a freer expression of the will of the people. One of the amendments approved provided that the ridings should be furnished with returning officers so that these officials would be familiar with the duties assigned to them in advance of the calling of the election. Although the term of office was set at one year, it was understood at the time that most of them would be continued from year to year, and that the position would be of a permanent character. Independent members of the Commons warmly supported the reform; but Mr. Meighen objected to it on the ground that it would enable the Liberals to shorten the period of the election campaign by fifteen days. But his objections were swamped in committee. More than 200 out of 245 returning officers have been dismissed in spite of the fact that
