GREAT BATTLE COMING SOON

Lecturer at Theatre Last Night Told of Armageddon Expected by him

W. Sargeant, of Toronto, speaking under the auspices of the International Bible Students' Association, lectured here Sunday night on the subject "Israel—the World's Hope." He pointed out that England fulfilled prophecy in declaring that Palestine was for the Jew, and also the fact that the Jews are flocking back to Palestine with a view to re-nationalization. He referred to the scriptural promises God made to Abraham that his seed should bless all nations of the world. This seed was to be of two kinds, viz., spiritual or heavenly, and natural or earthly. In the Church of Christ we find the heavenly seed, and in the Jews the earthly seed. Thus Israel in the highest sense consists of the followers of Christ, since St. Paul said, "If ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed and heirs according to the promise."

"The nations," declared the lecturer, are all preparing for the last great battle, the final struggle. The latest invention is a flying torpedo which will wipe out a city. England, France, United States, Japan and other countries are expending vast sums of money in warlike preparations. In The Letter Box

ECKOFF THOUGHT SUICIDE BUT REFRAINED.

We left Wednesday, April 7, for the Southern part of the coast to buy furs and take photographs. We went as far as Kitimaat and decided to run around Banks Island, as some people we met at Kitimaat had told us that there were some Indians sealing on Bonilla Island. We went there but found nobody. A storm came up while we were there and we had to stay as there was no way to get out, the sea being so rough. We waited there, but every day the water grew more rough. Night or day we were unable to get any sleep.—just on the look out all the time. Having very little to eat we had to take good care of the food we had.

Lost Money

On Monday evening the wind was worse than before. After supper we heard a noise on the bow and I ran to inspect the anchors, and found our heaviest anchor broken. At the same time I saw something drop out of my coat pocket into the water, but as I was so excited about the anchors I did not take any notice of my loss then. I told the other men about the anchors, and we decided we had to do something at once, so we ran the boat ahead—but found she was not moving ahead, then we tried to turn but could not on account of the wind, which was too strong for us, and we drifted on a rock.

There was nothing more we could do with the boat then, so we packed what we could ashore food and blankets. We spent the night under a tree—a very wet night—it was raining heavily. And furthermore, on looking I found that my purse containing \$3,100.00 was missing—it was my purse I had dropped over the bow of the boat the night before.

Boat was Wreck

We went down to the boat and found her a complete wreck. We then made a little camp in which to sleep and shelter from the rain—we had very little food left and were almost starving.

Finally one of my men, Engineer Jimmie Ryan, took the dinghy and started off to Prince Rupert for help—and relief was sent by the Provincial Police.

With the loss of my boat, which was not insured, and the further loss of thirty-one hundred dollars from my pocket, together with the hardships which my crew and I were suffering, at times my troubles seemed too great and I put my revolver to my head to get away from it all—but each time I did so the thought of the great pain I would cause my mother by taking my own life, deterred me, and thank God I am still strong and healthy and hoping to go to see my mother before very long.

I do not wish any harm but wishing everybody the best of luck!
