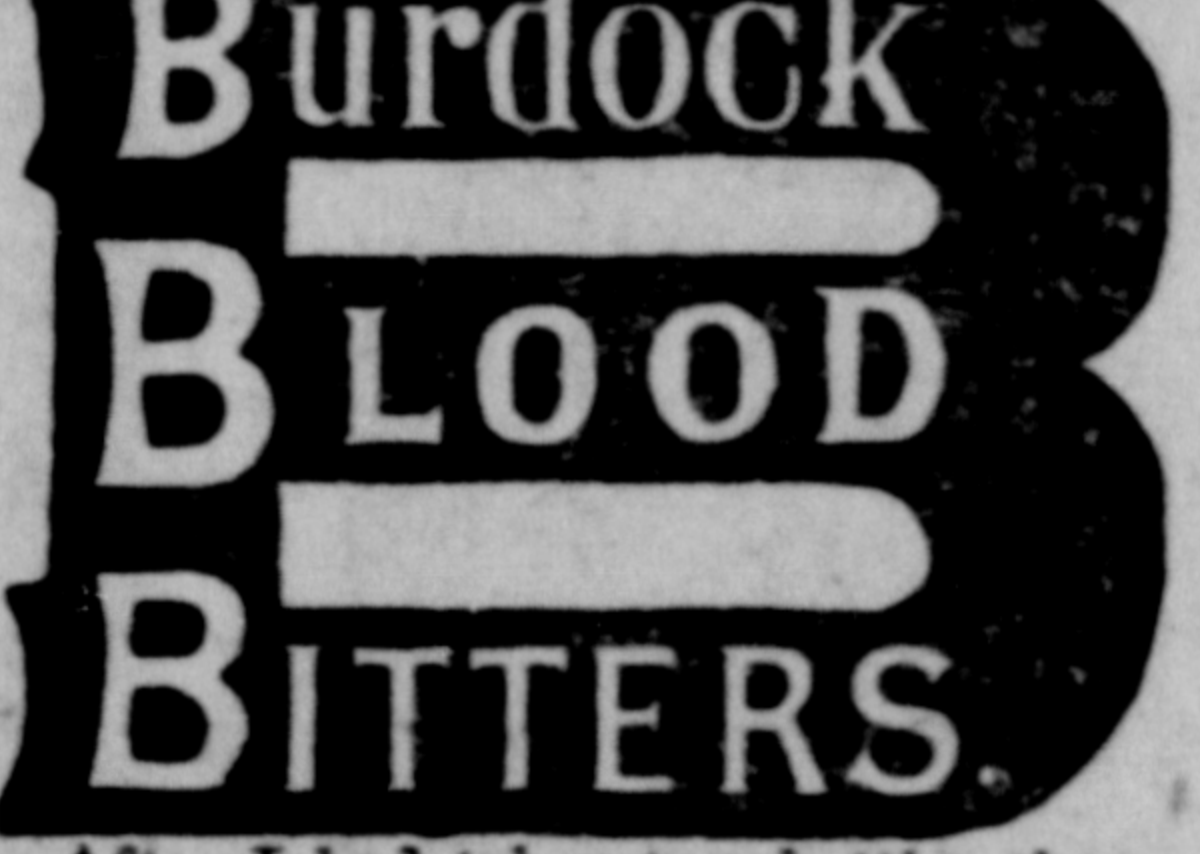
HAZELTON
