## NURSES DEAL WITH HUMAN BEINGS—NOT JUST MERE CASES

TORONTO, Ont., June 17. — (Canadian Press.) — Hon. Dr. Cody, chairman of the Board of Governors of Toronto University, addressing graduating nurses, besought them to remember always that they were dealing with "human beings, not with cases." "You come," he said, "in contrast with the great crisis of life. You come into contact with birth and with bereavement. You stand by when the physician has to choose which life shall be spared. You have an almost unique opportunity to cheer, guide and help in the great crisis of human life. I beseech you in the name of humanity never to become coldly professional, never mechanical."
