HOCKEY GAME IN NEW YORK

People of Biggest City Take to Game and Say "It's Great Stuff"

TEX RICKARD'S HAND

Twenty Thousand Attend Opening Game and Usual Audience is Ten Thousand

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. — (By Canadian Press)—Hockey, for long the winter headliner of Canadian sport but strangely, when the proximity of the Dominion and the United States is taken into consideration, only a "second-rate" pastime on this side of the border, now appears to have attained a lofty position with New York. And that position bears all the earmarks of becoming a permanent one.

Not quite a month has passed since the professional game was introduced by the National Hockey League, to a Metropolitan crowd, but already the powers that be are free to admit "it's great stuff." And when New Yorkers find themselves liking something that is new, that something is practically assured of "going over."

About twelve years ago hockey ranked high in the sport annals of this city. Hobey Baker, a name that every north American follower of the game knows well, had at that time just about reached his zenith as a puck-chaser. Hobey was styled by experts as "America's greatest hockey-flash" and whenever he was billed to take the ice with his team mates of the New York St. Nicholas Club a packed arena was certain. Hockey was then what promoters termed "a paying proposition," but it was to suffer a rude setback.

Rude Setback

With the coming of the Great War and the subsequent enlistment of men in the United States, Hobey was among the first to sign for service overseas. An ace in the U.S. Flying Corps, the renowned athlete served with distinction until his heroic career was brought to an abrupt halt with the crashing of his fighting plane.

Many predicted from that date that the game Hobey loved so well would die with him, and their predictions proved correct, for almost immediately attendance at hockey matches in New York and practically every other city in the United States where the game was favored, began to fall away. The public appeared to lose interest; the sport ceased to be so called "paying proposition," and promoters as a result gave it a back seat.

Rickard Interested

As far as New York was concerned, the game remained pretty much in the background until 1924 when rumor began making the rounds that "Tex" L. Rickard, admittedly the day's greatest sports showman, was becoming interested. The rumors finally became concrete and Rickard's efforts to promote the game bore fruit last November when the Madison Square Garden interests secured a franchise to operate a team in the National Hockey League. Now with the operation of that team—the New York Americans—hockey is apparently again sitting on a high perch here.

The opening clash of National League teams in the Garden drew a packed house of almost 20,000, believed to be the largest crowd ever to witness a hockey match. It had, of course, hardly been expected that that high attendance figure would be

maintained immediately thereafter, but crowds estimated at 10,000 or more have turned out for every professional match so far staged here. And Mr. Rickard and his associates express themselves as being well satisfied and certain that the professional pastime is "catching on."

Intercollegiate hockey tilts, featuring teams from Canada and the United States, are also drawing substantial crowds, and such is the demand for variety in the sport that afternoon games have been introduced with marked success.

Sunday Evening Games

The amateur field of the winter sport is another line that has received a major invasion. Teams from Boston and New York—five in all—have formed the Eastern Amateur Hockey League and they present a double bill to crowds ranging from 3,000 to 8,000 each Sunday evening.

Three years ago he knew little about billiards but now he is one of the outstanding players in England and it is said he will become one of the greatest amateurs the game has known.

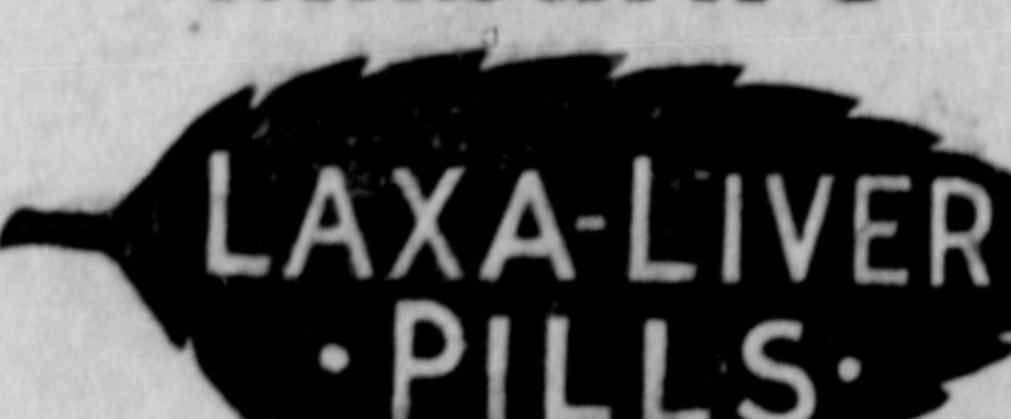

After a long period of waiting on account of the exceptionally mild weather, hockey has at last been started in such places as Prince George, Vanderhoof and Burns Lake. For the first time this winter it was possible last week to produce a sheet of ice at the Prince George rink and hockey practice has now been started. It is expected to arrange a game between Prince George and Aleza Lake players shortly. Owing to the late start, it is now doubtful if Prince George will be able to take part in any provincial championship games following the decision of that place to affiliate with the B.C. Amateur Hockey Association.

In the first hockey game of the season at Burns Lake, Francois Lake won from Burns by a score of 5 to 4. It was a tight contest from start to finish and the end of the fourth period found the game tied 4 to 4. It was decided to play five minutes a side until a winning goal was obtained and, after the first five minutes had nearly elapsed, Hickey, for Francois Lake, slipped in the required tally leaving Francois Lake the winner in one of the most exciting hockey games ever pulled off in Burns Lake.
