OUTLOOK IS BRIGHT SAYS SIR HENRY TO MONTREAL CANADIANS

MONTREAL, Jan. 20.—Sir Henry Thornton, in addressing the Young Men's Canadian Club yesterday, spoke of the bright outlook for the future of Canada and expressed his opinion that a decided impetus would be given to immigration this year by agreement entered into between the Canadian and British governments with the transportation and shipping companies participating.

This agreement, he pointed out, provided for greatly reduced rates for families, single farm workers, and household workers. They vary from fifteen to forty-five dollars, the former sum to Halifax and the latter to Vancouver. The rate to Winnipeg is seventeen dollars and fifty cents. Children up to 17 years of age are carried free. The balance of the total cost of passage is to be arranged as a joint contribution made by the British government, the Dominion government and the steamship company. These exceptionally low rates would, he thought, bring about the immigration to Canada of a larger number of settlers in 1926 than in any previous year with the exception of a few of the very outstanding years prior to the war.



Pretty Stories and Innocent Jibes at Vancouver People by Writer in Victoria Newspaper

Winnipeg indignantly denies that Vancouver is the third largest city in Canada; but there is one thing that Winnipeg cannot deny; that more interesting things happen in Vancouver than happen in Winnipeg or in any other city in Canada—if we are to believe the things we read about in the Vancouver newspapers.

One thing happened in Vancouver last week that could not possibly have happened in Winnipeg or in any of the eastern cities. We do not believe such a thing could have happened even in Victoria, notwithstanding the remarkably mild and genial weather we have had this winter. We have already made a note of the remarkable thing that happened in Vancouver, or rather on one of the golf courses in the environs of that remarkable city whose future is destined to be even more remarkable than its present. Yet we are not completely satisfied with that story as told by the Vancouver golfer. It is not as good a story as it might have been if told by a journalist, or even by a mere newspaper man.
