STEWART

The year 1925 was the banner year so far as regards mining development in this district but it will be surpassed by 1926. During the 1925 the following fourteen properties in the district shipped ore: Premier, B.C. Silver, Indian, Silver Crest, B.C. Bonza, Outland Silver-Bar, Cantu, Riverside, Homestake, Porter Idaho, L. & L., Goldie, Bayview and Terminus. Winter development work is now being carried out on the Gloria, Porter Idaho, Silverado, Glacier Creek, Dunwell, Albany, Lakeview, L. and L., Emperor, Ore Mountain, Independence, Riverside, Mountain View, Premier, B.C. Silver, National Silver, Big Missouri, Silver Crest and Indian.
