

A Hard Candy Recipe



Take 2 cups sugar and a little more than 1 cup of white corn syrup (be sure it is white syrup and 1 cup water. Cook, stirring constantly, until it strings a little from the spoon; then add 1 cup Pacific Milk and a little later 1 cup raw peanuts. Continue boiling until it gets brittle in water. Remove from stove, stir in vanilla and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon baking soda—work quickly—pour out on large greased pan to cool.

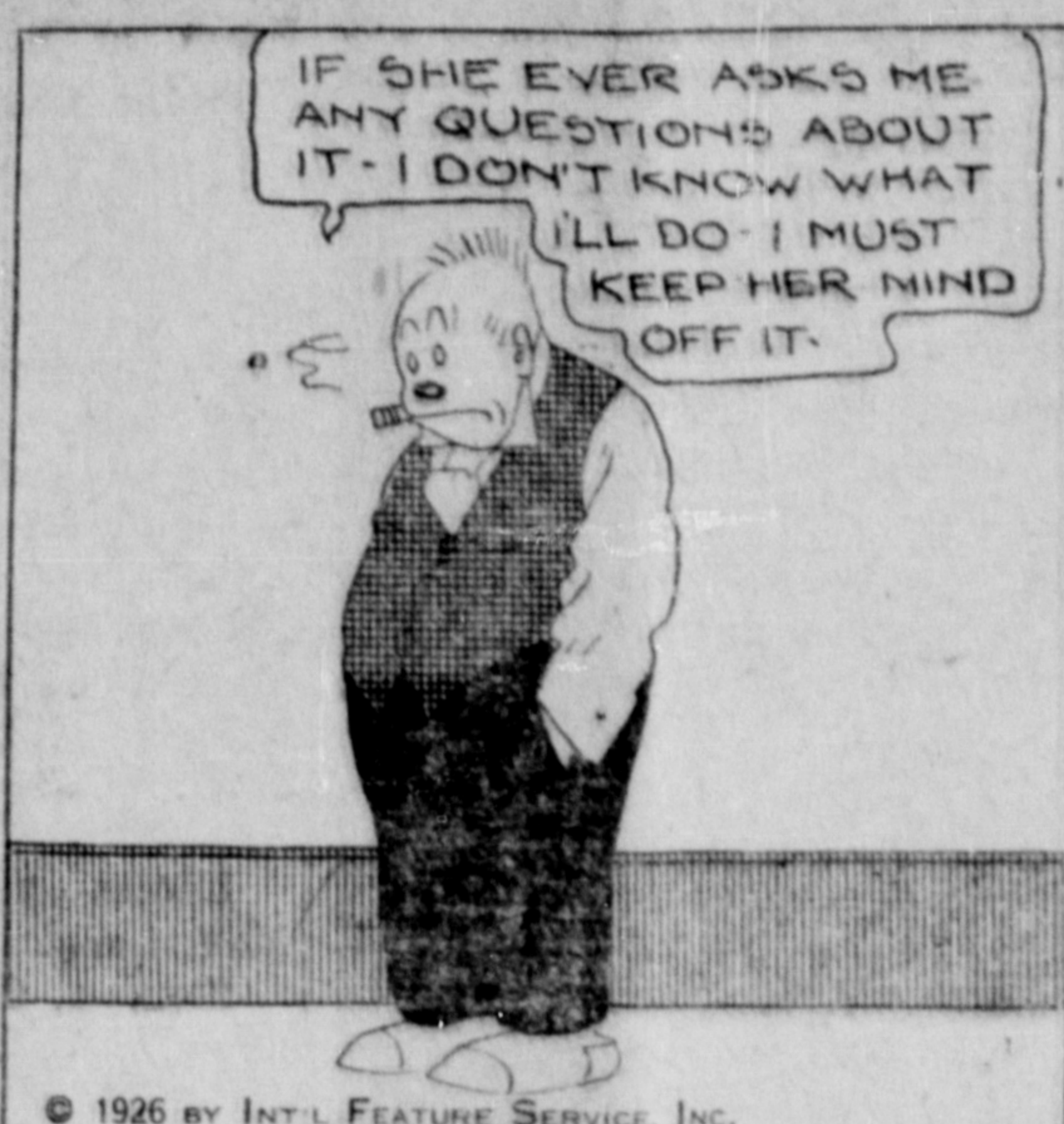

PRESBYTERY MEETING OPENS HERE TOMORROW

Financial Matters and Season's Activities Will be Dealt With at United Church Session

A meeting of the presbytery of Prince Rupert of the United Church of Canada will open in the First United Church here tomorrow morning. Business will be largely in regard to financial affairs in connection with the year's program of work. The session will open with a devotional period at 9 o'clock led by Rev. Arthur Barner of Toronto, superintendent of Indian Missions for Canada. Then there will be lectures on religious education and evangelism by Rev. A. M. Pound of Hazelton and Rev. Evan Baker of Prince Rupert respectively. These will be open to the public.

Delegates who will attend the presbytery include Rev. G. G. Backer and Rev. Evan Baker of Prince Rupert; Rev. W. H. Pierce who is already here from Port Essington; Rev. Arthur Barner and Rev. William Allen who arrived on the power boat Taplow this afternoon from Port Simpson; Rev. A. M. Pound of Hazelton, Rev. Victor Sansum of Kispiox, and Rev. J. H. Young of Terrace, who will arrive from the interior on tomorrow's train, and Rev. Dr. Oliver Darwin, superintendent of missions, who will arrive from Vancouver on the Prince Rupert tomorrow morning.

It is expected that the business will be completed by tomorrow afternoon.

ALBERNI SHIPPED ALMOST 40,000,000 FEET OF LUMBER 1925

ALBERNI, Feb. 9.—Nearly 120,000 tons of shipping was handled at Port Alberni during 1925, according to statistics, issued yesterday. A total of thirty-seven ships of 119,056 registered tons docked there during the year to load 39,238,870 feet of lumber. In addition, 1,415,000 feet of shingles and 1,363 cedar poles were exported. This exceeds all previous records established by the Vancouver Island West coast port.

The bulk of the lumber shipped during the last year was consigned to New York. Nineteen vessels loaded at Port Alberni for the big metropolis. Japan was the next best market, nine vessels loading for that country. Six ships took lumber to California, two ships to Florida and one to Montreal. Of the 39,238,870 feet of lumber exported from Port Alberni during 1925, 27,426,330 feet were consigned to New York.

CHAPLIN'S "GOLD RUSH" DIFFERENT IN STYLE

Standing Room Only in Westholme Theatre When Picture is Shown for First Time

There was standing room only in the Westholme Theatre last night when Charlie Chaplin's latest comedy "The Gold Rush," was shown for the first time. The picture proved most entertaining and is novel in that there is an element of drama to go with the comedy. Differing from the style of Chaplin's past pictures, there is a theme in the play recording how Chaplin as a poor but exceedingly funny prospector goes into Alaska and makes a fortune. The scenery to a large extent is quite realistic although the nature of the pic-

ture makes some ridiculousness along this line necessary. The play abounds with laughs though it also has its sentimentally touching moments. The "Gold Rush" will be filmed again tonight and tomorrow night at the Westholme.
